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Women Increase As Family Heads

In Colorado County, as in most other parts of the country, more families are headed by women than ever before.

In the absence of husbands, they have taken over the responsibility of earning a living, maintaining a home and bringing up their children by themselves.

In 1970, when the last census was taken, it was found that 341 local families, amounting to 11.7% of the total, were headed by women.

Since then there has been a general increase throughout the country, according to the Department of Commerce.

In Colorado County, as a result of the environment and the proportion is now approximately 13.7%.

Elsewhere in the United States by way of comparison, the number of women who head their own families is 14.1 million more than in 1970.

Why the sudden increase? The Institute of Life Insurance has an explanation for it.

It states that in 1968, for example, being widowed (46% were the principal reason for women moving into the category of single women) had increased, going from 10% to 13%.

More and more, as a result, children are being brought up by their mothers alone. The Census Bureau reports that 14% of all children in the United States under the age of 18, were being raised by their mothers.

In Colorado County, according to the latest Government figures, 219 of the families with female heads have children under 18 and 77 of those have children under six.

The changes in population are attributed to such factors as changing attitudes toward marriage and toward separation and divorce. Better job opportunities for women has also been a factor.

Ag. Comm. White Praises Bill Limit Beef Imports

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White praised the special efforts of six Texas legislators who are responsible for the bill to prohibit purchases of foreign beef by state and local government institutions and schools.

Representative George L. Preston of Paris introduced HB 318, co-sponsored by Representatives W. S. (Bill) Heist of Paducah, John Wilson of La Grange, Susan Carley McBe of Del Rio, and others. It was carried in the Senate by Senators William T. Moore of Bryan and A. M. Alkin of Paris.
