2 Gas Completions At Provident City, 2 Tests Staked

Two new gas completions in the Provident City area and another completion in the Eagle Lake and southwest of Columbus highlight oil and gas activity. It has been reported that Duer Wagner & Co. have completed the two wells in a new pay zone four miles northeast of Provident City. The wells are the No. 1-18 Baber with open flow potential of 680,000 cubic feet per day from the Vega at 6,200 feet. The other completion is the No. 2-18 Baber with open flow potential of 740,000 cubic feet from the Frio at 8,900 feet. The wells are on a 163-acre lease in the R. P. Allen survey, A-905. Legislature Closes

Texas has a new \$654 million public school finance act and authorization for a Public Utilities Commission to regulate telephone rates and services and to control other utilities (except gas) in rural areas. Cities may elect to come under the Commission after two years with utilities other than telephones. Gas will be regulated by the state Railroad Commission. Both the school finance and utilities acts were among the last major pieces of legislation approved by the 66th Legislature which ended its session at midnight June 2.
