# Late Zeno Smith Cited By Rangers

The following story about Zeno Smith, a liberalist career in the Texas Rangers, appeared in the June 1st issue of the San Antonio Express-News, and is reprinted in part for interest of Mr. Smith's friends in this community. He was a native of Colorado County and lived here many years before beginning his career in the Rangers. The story follows:  
Not all the good guys wear white hats.  
In fact, the trademark of one of the good guys, Texas Ranger Zeno Smith, was a black, broadrimmed western hat.  
Smith roamed a wide South Texas range during his heyday in the 1930's and 40's. He was in the San Antonio in 34 years of continuous Ranger service.  
During those years he played a key part in many of the headline cases marking those years.  
And yet, Smith himself was no headline hunter.  
Working in cities and towns throughout South Texas, Smith always gave credit for breaking a case to the local law enforcement officer who had the charge. He realized they were usually running for re-election, while he was neither running, nor from anything.  
Smith died at the age of 69 in 1972 of a heart attack.  
When he returned to work after his first attack, Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison threatened to take his state car away if he did not cut down on his work hours. His doctors had ordered Smith to cut down, and he did. He eased up to 10 or 12 hours a day, quite a concession for a man who sometimes went 24 hours without sleep to break a case.  
When it became obvious to the DPS that their definition of a full work day and Smith's definition were miles apart, the department reluctantly returned to the status quo.  
Smith promptly signed on as a Wilson County deputy sheriff, a post he held until his death in 1972.  
The Texas legislature passed a resolution at the time of Smith's retirement, memorializing him as a "tireless"

able" man and urging the DPS to "rethink him" "at all costs".
