Officials Plan
Projects

One hundred state officials of the Knights of Columbus in a three-day planning meeting in Tyler recently learned that Texas led the nation in membership gains the past fractional year ending June 30. Leon J. Spanzel of Eagle Lake, head of the \$5,000 member Texas organization, said the state officers, committeemen and district officials also bi-participated in a wide variety of projects including renewal of their fight against abortion, celebrating the U. S. Bicentennial, broadening youth and sports programs and urging K. C. Councils and individuals to adopt refugees from Vietnam and Cambodia. Inducted into office by Bishop Warren L. Boudreaux of Beaumont, State K. C. Chaplain, were Spanzel as State Deputy, Don J. Sauerman of Dallas as State Secretary, Emil E. Ogden of Abilene as Treasurer, Tim VonDoblen of Goliad as Advocate, Ed Brossman of Houston as Warden, Floyd A. Tulestak of Pearland as Membership Director and Carl L. LeBlanc of Nederland as Program Director. In business sessions, the Knights were urged to support state and local Right to Life and Birthright organizations and informed of a K. C. sponsored essay contest for high school and college students on the topic of "Adoption, Not Abortion," with \$750.00 first prizes in U. S. Savings Bonds in each division and other prizes in lesser amounts, with essays limited to 500 words and submitted to local K. C. Councils before October 1. Entry requirements will be published in August. Regarding the Bicentennial, the Knights were urged to initiate, organize and participate in community projects to the fullest and were provided with a list of a large number of activities they could stage. Youth activities sponsored by Councils were broadened to include, in addition to the Knights' own Columbian Squares Circles, other groups such as CYO units, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, Children's Homes, Boys Clubs and others.
