Bird Pictures On Display At Library for 2 Weeks

Through the woods with his father and lying scarcely breathing as he watched, for example a hummingbird feeding her young. Earning money for his chosen life-time pursuit meant many small jobs, one of the more helpful ones, at Tiffany's, learning a copper engraving which taught him control of his hands. Later he worked as a brass engraver in Main at \$25.00 a week, saving and painting there for three years. Finally, he was able to finance the building of a 24-foot sloop on which he set sail in August 1895 at the age of 26 for a bird-painting expedition along the Atlantic coast. When food became scarce he was washed from Bar Harbor to Key West, where he docked, earn some money as a farm laborer and continue his journey. By 1898 he was back in Brooklyn with a filled sketchbook. Rex headed West on his dedicated quest, a truck-sack of supplies always at hand. Besides capturing the birds in pencil, ink and watercolor he practiced becoming their friends in the manner of other great naturalists. Signing on as a deckhand on a fishing boat for a two-year cruise he continued from West to North. At the end of this voyage and with his last \$500.00 he bought a farm near Kent, Connecticut, settling there to paint on his beloved "Whickadee Valley."

One cold night there examining some 400 pieces of his work before the fire, he felt mounting dissatisfaction with the number of colors and artistic achievement of our times. In 1941, when Rex was asked by an official of the state of Connecticut if he would sell his originals to a museum he immediately agreed remarking: "I want people, especially school children, to know what America's birdlife really looks like." These are now housed in the Harkness Estate Museum near New London.

Rex Brasher lived into his late eighties and saw a nephew carry on in Kent, Connecticut. Not painting but carving remarkably life-like and delightful animal figures. Jack Benton Scott's "Art Genius of the Bird World" is the source from which the greater part of the above text was derived.

New Phone Directories Go Out Sat.

Mailing of the 1975-76 edition of the Eagle Lake telephone directory will begin Saturday, August 2, R. L. Oldman, local manager for Southwestern Bell, announced. The cover of the directory, designed by artist Stanley Melnick for use throughout the Bell System during the Bicentennial year, commemorates the nation's 200th birthday and marks the 100th anniversary of the invention of the telephone. Among the 32 characters depicted on the Bicentennial cover are the faces of figures from American history, celebrities, and mythical personalities—each using a different phone to convey a message.

Remember When??

The first few pages of the book are known as the "Call Guide" and users a "simple and quicker method for finding emergency numbers, but also provides information for placing both local and long-distance calls. The new directory contains approximately 3,000 names. It has 18 pages of alphabetical listings and 40 pages of classified listings. "We've ordered 750 copies of the new directory," Oldman said, "to take care of the normal growth and demand that we expect to receive during the year." The initial mailing will consist of about 2,500 directories. "The new directory is an up-to-date list of the latest information concerning Eagle Lake telephone numbers," Oldman said. "If you are not sure of the number you are calling, please look it up in your new directory. It will save you time."

Free Immunization Clinic Here Friday, Aug. 8

The Free Immunization Clinic sponsored by the Texas Department of Health Resources, held in Eagle Lake every second Friday of each month will be held on Friday, August 8 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Primary School on East E Street. Immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DTP), polio, measles, and rubella will be given to infants, pre-schoolers, and school age children. Tetanus, diphtheria will be given to adults. In view of the law requiring immunizations for entrance to school, parents are urged to start immunization of their children at an early age. Personal immunization records, showing dates and kinds of immunizations received are given so that parents will have the immunization record of each child. Any questions on immunizations can be answered at the clinic.
