### Low Yield Payments May Be Available

The Colorado County office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service advises that a low-yield payment for a farm may be considered whenever the production of cotton or feed grains is determined to be abnormal by low because of natural disaster conditions.

To be considered for payment the producer may file a written request for low yield with the county ASCS office within fifteen days following completion of harvest of the affected crop. In addition the farmer must not dispose of the crop residue until the farm has been visited by a representative of the county ASCS office.

Loan Price Supports 1975 rice price support loan rates have been announced as follows: long grain head rice at \$13.85 per cwt., to \$16.00 cwt. for broken. Support prices for grain sorghum are: No. 2 or better with 14% moisture or less, \$2.85 per cwt.; cotton, mid-lands, \$34.37 per cwt.
