STAYING ABREAST IS OBJECTIVE FOR RICE EMPLOYEES

Approximately seventeen teachers and employees attended summer school, or workshops, to increase their skills or teaching techniques for their particular fields for this school year.

Attending Sam Houston State University in Huntsville were Floyd Search and Rodney Harris, who each earned six hours credit in a six-week period; and Mr. Hottel earned seventeen hours in a twelve-week study of math and physical science.

In a three-week study at the University of Houston, Jack Grammer earned three hours as a participant in the Petroleum Institute.

Mrs. Marjorie Crabb attended the VOE workshop at the Royal Coach Inn in Houston. Approximately 600 teachers were present for the week's lectures and observation of equipment used in business and VOE labs.

Six weeks of study were spent at Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos by Erich Gabry and William D. White. Mr. Gabry received four hours credit in Quantitative Analysis, and Mr. White earned three hours credit in Fundamentals of Derivative Equations.

Mrs. Iris Danties attended a one-week Career Education Implementation Institute held in Edna.

Studying course work in mathematics for twelve weeks at Prairie View A&M was Allen Jozwiak.

Earning four hours credit in mathematics, the Royal W. A&M, he enrolled in Technical Change, an agriculture education course, and at Blinn Jr. College in Brenham through the American Breeders Service; Mr. Roberts studied Artificial Breeding.

Six weeks of physical education study was credited to Mike Rice at the University of Houston, Victoria campus. Houston and Dallas were the sites for auto mechanic study by Sidney Frey. He attended a week workshop at the CM

Entrance Exams Required for College Admission Annual Staff

High school juniors and seniors seem to converse in a strange code each time they discuss PSAT-NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test-National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) and SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test).

The SAT, an admission requirement at most colleges, is administered by the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB). It is given nationally five times a year, and Rice students can obtain aid in registering through their counselors.

The three-hour test serves as a measure of students' aptitude for college work. The College Board will send the scores to three colleges of the student's choice as part of the \$6.50 registration fee. Those who can't afford test fees can apply for a fee waiver through the school.

Anxiety is associated with the test. Students are afraid they won't do well enough to be accepted at a particular college.

Still, some students consider "intimidating" letters to "crave" for the SAT. The college board did some studies and concluded that short-term coaching has little effect on scores.

The SAT is a measure of developed reasoning abilities in verbal and math areas rather than a measure of an achievement in a particular area.

The verbal part of the test includes reading passages and vocabulary. The math questions require a basic knowledge of algebra and geometry.

As an introduction to the SAT, many students also take the PSAT-NMSQT in their junior or senior year.

Library Receives 80 New Books

Energy Crunch Hits Rice High

How would you like to have a \$40,000 electric bill? Rice High School was presented with a \$40,000 electric bill for the 1974-75 school year. This was not really a shock to the school, figuring on how much electricity they used for lighting and air conditioning.

Principal Fred Gramham told us of the fact that they will be cutting down on the bill for next year. In order to do this, he has authorized the air conditioning to be raised to the 70 degrees instead of the 75 degrees instead of the 70 degrees it was last year, and stay just as cool. The lights outside the building will be turned off at night instead of leaving them on constantly.
