Bud has been a fine instructor among collegiate rowers carrying a better than B average while competing in the bareback and the bulldogging events. The "dust bowl" and the public's indignation of the dust farm families resulted in expansion of efforts of the government's Soil Conservation Service, which had just been created in 1933.

## City Council's Bids, Hikes Employee Pay

Eagle Lake City Council in session on Tuesday last week approved the purchase of a packer unit for the city's new garbage truck and for 600 feet of new fire hose, and also authorized pay increases for the city's employees.

On the recommendation of the city's equipment committee, appointed by Mayor Elmer Strass, and including Councilmen Alvin Kohlfelt and Gene Baker and City Manager T. J. Smith, the bid of Pleasant Mfg. Co. of Pecos, Texas offering a new 24-cubic foot yard packer for \$5000 less a three percent discount or \$4725 was approved. The bid was the lowest received. Pak-Mor Mfg. Co. offered a packer unit for \$4700 which makes the packer unit \$656 less than the Pak-Mor unit.

## Comm. Court Accepts Group Insurance Bid

A new policy to provide group hospitalization insurance and life insurance for the elected county officials and employees and their dependents was approved by Commissioners' Court in regular session Monday morning. The court received only one bid although County Judge Lester Crane said that he had been contacted for specifications by at least a dozen firms. He said that it is a possibility that some of the proposals may be better than when they look a lot at the county's loss-ratio and due to the fact that the county is offering only a one-year contract.

He explained that when there are changes in the specifications, county is required to advertise for bids, but if the specifications remain the same the county has the option to renew with the current policy holder. Numerous changes that proposed to increase room allowances were included in the new specifications and the county was offering only a one-year contract since it is not sure that more changes won't be needed.
