

by the court and the district attorney Houston Munson, the prosecuting officer for the State, to put an end to some of the crime which has been evident in this end of the county.

"The majority of the cases in each term of district court seem to originate from this area," said the chief. He added that stiff sentences such as the one given Lira may help to put a damper on some of these crimes.

Chief Chism added these words of appreciation to the jury and court:

"I want to express my sincere thanks to each member of the jury, the District Attorney and to Judge B. B. Schraub for a job well done in trying the case The State of Texas vs. Joe Daniel Lira. With people like these I think we will see a decrease in our crime rate. Again I want to thank each and every one that had a hand in trying this case."

States-Senator for Texas. He was elected in 1961 at the age of 35, the youngest member of the Senate. He was re-elected in 1966 and again in 1972.

As chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, he participates in the decisions of the Senate GOP leadership and attends regular Congressional leadership meetings with the President and White House staff. He is the senior Republican on the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs and second-ranking GOP member on the Armed Services Committee. At present he is the vice-chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence Operations.

Before his election to the Senate, Tower was a government professor at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, Texas. He received his bachelor's degree in political science from Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas in 1948, and his master's degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas in 1953. He did post-graduate work at the University of London. In April of this year, Tower was honored at the dedication of the John Goodwin Tower Chair of Political Sciences at Southwestern

nishes land must own the land or have a valid lease from the landowner that gives normal farming control for the entire year.

B. A producer who furnishes water must hold a valid water contract from a recognized water company or furnish the necessary water from wells they own, control and pay operating and maintenance costs.

C. A producer who furnishes equipment must own the equipment in sufficient quantity and variety to produce a rice crop.

D. A producer who furnishes labor must do so by his own work or with labor force that he employs, pays, and personally supervises.

E. Each of the items furnished, land, labor, water or equipment, must be in sufficient quantity to produce an acreage of rice equal to or greater than the acreage they assign to the farm on which the rice will be grown.

This information is being published at this time since producers will soon begin making plans for the 1976 rice crop and the manner in which they will participate, said Streckfus. "Be sure the plans made meet the conditions as outlined above or the county committee will not be in position to approve the producer allotment assignment to a farm in 1976. It is also very important that the plans producers make and are approved by the county committee be carried out according to the approved plan. Failure to do this could place the county committee in the position of having to withdraw approval of the allotment assignment after the rice is planted."

yield will be \$407,872.30; and the county additional tax roll is based on \$76,939,038 in values and with a 30c rate will yield \$230,817.12. Total taxes produced from the state and two county tax rolls will be \$731,111.00.

Hajovsky noted that the total valuations for the state, before homestead exemptions, amounted to \$85,970,948. He said that the state homestead exemptions totaled \$7,031,310.

The total county tax values of \$83,970,348 were reduced by \$2,395,890 due to the 65 and over homestead exemp-
