LET'S PRESERVE THE BALD EAGLE

No one knows when the bald eagle began its gradual decline; its numbers have been going downhill for perhaps a century. But since World War II the losses have been drastic. The bald eagle has suffered great reductions in its numbers from shooting and even more from increasing destruction of its habitat as a result of growing human population and activities. Many eagles are being killed, at least indirectly, by pesticides. DDT, especially, gets into the fish bald eagles eat. It causes eggshells to be so thin that the eggs break before they can hatch.

For thousands of years, eagles have been a source of inspiration to mankind. They appear throughout human history in art, literature, and religion as symbols of majesty and independence, spiritual aspiration and divine power. To the biologist, the eagle is among nature's most perfect creatures, representing 60-million years of evolution. The bald eagle has few, if any, enemies other than man. We can save the bald eagle. Eliminate the use of persistent pesticides wherever possible. Protect nesting trees for birds and old trees suitable for potential nesting sites. Close off nesting sites from human activity during the breeding season. Protect roosting sites. Demand stricter enforcement of federal laws relating to the bald eagle and its problems.
