

Record Crop to Keep U.S. Rice Prices Down

In an Associated Press report in last Wednesday's Houston Chronicle, the Agriculture Department was quoted as saying that rice farmers probably will not see much further increase in market prices this season because of improved world supplies and the record U.S. crop now being harvested.

Early price quotes for 1975 rice generally ranged from \$9.50 to \$10.50 per cwt. not too different from a year ago, reported the department's Outlook and Situation Board.

The market is not expected to strengthen as it did in the latter part of last season and farmers will likely fall short of last year's \$10.45 hundredweight figure.

On the optimistic side, the report stated that the domestic and export demand for rice is expected to continue growing. Even so, USDA estimates point to a record rice crop of 24.4 million bushels.

At the end of the 1975-76 marketing year next July 31st, the report estimates that the carryover of 7.1 million cwt. at the start of the season may rise to between 15.2 to 20.1 million hundredweight.
