How Fire Prevention Week Began ...

The Great Chicago Fire of 1871 is the only major conflagration whose anniversary is marked by an international observance — Fire Prevention Week — proclaimed each year in the United States and Canada.

It was originated in 1911 as Fire Prevention Day by the Fire Marshals Association of North America. On recommendation of a committee of the National Fire Protection Association, it was extended to a week in 1922.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls Oct. 9, date of the Chicago disaster. The fire killed 250 persons and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million.

Dates for Fire Prevention Week 1975 are Oct. 5-11.

GARWOOD FIRE DEPT. FLASHES

Anaplasmosis Cases Are On Increase

There has been a sizeable increase of Anaplasmosis cases in cattle recently according to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at A&M. Livestock producers in Colorado County should be on the look out for the disease to prevent undue losses of cattle.

Anaplasmosis is caused by a small parasite that enters the red blood cells of the infected animal. It is usually spread by ticks, but also can be spread by blood transfusion or even through instruments that come in contact with the blood of the animal. Care must be exercised to keep equipment for dehorning, ear marking and branding clean and disinfected between uses. Infected animals may go down, breathe rapidly and show evidence of constipation. Frequent urination and bloating may be observed. As the disease progresses and the fever rises, the membranes around the nose and eye may become pale or yellow tinged. Since these symptoms are common of other diseases, it is recommended that a veterinarian be called early to make a diagnosis and initiate treatment. To wait may mean a dead animal, as untreated animals can die within 24 to 48 hours after the symptoms are noted.

Two tests are commonly used to diagnose Anaplasmosis. Both require blood samples and can be performed at the A&M Laboratory at a cost of \$2.00 per sample. Postage and veterinary charges must also be added.

The Anaplasmosis tests can help a rancher determine which animals are carriers and capable of spreading the disease. Currently control is up to the individual livestock producer. There are basically four types of control.

1. Low-level feeding of antibiotics such as 0.5 milligrams of chlorotetracycline per pound of body weight per day during the season that the crop currently is estimated at 950,000 pounds per hundredweight.

Estimates for most crops remained the same as for August. Corn remained a near-record crop at 115.5 million bushels; wheat, 131.1 million bushels; rice, almost 24.9 million pounds per hundredweight; sorghum, 394.4 million bushels; and soybeans, 9.1 million bushels.

THIS DAY

October 9, 1852 — This day... One hundred and twenty-three years ago... marks the birth of James Booth Lockwood, explorer, in 1852. Lockwood, an Army lieutenant, learned that the Lady Franklin Bay Expedition under the command of Lieutenant Adolphus Greely was about to leave for the Arctic. He volunteered to join the expedition, in one ten-day trip to Greenland, he covered one hundred and thirty-five miles with the thermometer indicating to seventy-four degrees below freezing. He reached a point closer to the North Pole than any other man had achieved. Unfortunately, supply ships never reached the expedition and Lieutenant Lockwood and many other members of the Greely Expedition died of starvation.

Pecans Up, Cotton Down In Crop Report

AUSTIN—According to the September crop report released recently, Texas cotton production has dropped almost 75,000 bales while pecan production is expected to increase by 20 million pounds over last year's crop. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

Cotton production, estimated at 3.1 million bales, decreased because of weather and insect damage on the High and Low Plains. A yield of approximately 3,025,000 bales is expected in 1975.

This year's cotton crop still is almost 23 percent above the 2,462,000 bales gained in 1974, which was one of the smallest crops in 30 years, White noted.

The Texas pecan crop estimate reflects an increase of 53 percent over last year's crop of only 38 million pounds.
