PO Improvement
In Effect Sat.

Services To Be Improved

The U.S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program will go into effect at the Houston Post Office on October 11, 1975.

Under the new program, E. C. Stevenson, District Manager/Postmaster of the Houston Post Office said.

Under the program, first-class mail will receive service that is equal to or better than airmail.

The major new service step will extend to all first-class mail weighing 13 ounces or less.

Under the new program, there no longer will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery.

"Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 ounces), which includes air parcel service, and international airmail are unaffected by the improvement program," Stevenson said.

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Letter Mailing Rate
Goes to 13¢ Dec. 28

The cost of mailing that first class letter will go up to 13 cents comes Dec. 28.

The U.S. Postal Service announced last week that will be the effective date of a three-cent increase in the letter mailing charge, with increases also due in the fees for other categories of mail.

Among the major increases are:

Thirteen cents for the first ounce and 11 cents for each additional ounce of mail sent first class; 9 cents for a postal card, and 17 cents for air mail.

However, the Postal Service said there will not be any advantage in sending domestic letters air mail after Oct. 11, since all first class mail will be going by air by that date. There will not be any new air mail stamps, but there will be new 13-cent, 11-cent and 24-cent stamps.

Parcel post rates are to be increased by an average of 10 percent.
