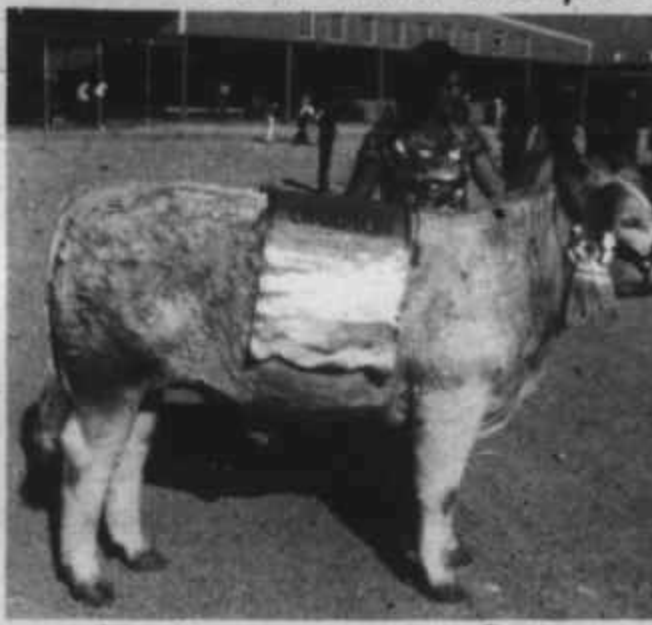


Shows Reserve Grand Champion

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Texas Cattle Raisers Call For Brucellosis Investigation

FORT WORTH - Calling on Congress to authorize a high-level feasibility study of the brucellosis problem, the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association reiterated its stand that brucellosis can be controlled to the point where it is virtually eliminated, but it cannot be "eradicated" under the present program.

In seeking a congressional investigation by reliable scientists, the Association is following the plan instituted last summer by Congress when it authorized an unbiased team to thoroughly study the brucellosis problem and report back its findings. The association's efforts were praised by the study, which is claimed to be the most comprehensive study of the disease which has been conducted in this country.

The association does not ask for its opinion to be accepted as fact. What it does ask is that the possibility be accepted that the present USDA Brucellosis Eradication Program may be founded on questionable scientific and social axioms. The truth can only be ascertained by an unbiased study conducted by a team of reliable scientists.

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FHA Housing Program Fills a Gap

The Farmers Home Administration Housing Loan Program provides credit for housing to rural residents who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere. Currently, many eligible residents without adequate housing in open country rural areas might qualify for a loan.

The regular loans now bear a 9% interest rate with a maximum term of 33 years to repay. This loan is for applicants who have reasonable ability to repay.

Farmers Home also has an interest credit program whereby the interest can be reduced from 9% down to as low as 1% depending on the applicant's adjusted gross income.

Applicants' housing cannot be over 1800 square feet for single family.

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Four Antlerless Permit Areas



Deer permits for the 1975 deer hunting season in Colorado County, Nov. 15th through Jan. 4th, will be issued on Monday, Nov. 18th at the County Courthouse in Columbus in the four areas as shown on the map above. The permits will be issued on the basis of acreage shown and a portion of that amount will not qualify for an additional permit. To qualify for the first permit you must have the acreage as required for that particular area, commented Parks and Wildlife biologists series of 3000.

Other deer permits were issued to Harold Thomas 224-542, George Robber 317, Floyd Smith 344, Lawrence Smith 344, and James Smith 344. The permits will be issued on the basis of acreage shown and a portion of that amount will not qualify for an additional permit.
