Citizens of this area learned with great sadness of the death of W. E. Lenhart, one of the most prominent citizens, on Wednesday morning, October 22nd in Eagle Lake Community Hospital.

W. E. Lenhart was born December 12, 1881, in Clarksville, Iowa the son of Henry and Sarah Lenhart. After his mother's death, he and his father moved to Texas in April of 1896 and settled in the Lissie community.

He graduated from Southern University, Georgetown, Texas, in 1900. In 1904 representatives of the university presented him a memento. He was the only living member of that graduation class they could locate.

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More Families In Top Brackets

Because most Colorado County residents are earning more than they did in other years, and because more women are working and bringing home paychecks these days, many local families have moved into higher income brackets.

To the extent that the added cash helps them to cope with the never-ending rise in the cost of living, it is a good thing. To the extent that it puts them into more-costly tax brackets, it is bad.

Some local families, whose earnings had previously been below \$8,000, have graduated to the \$10,000 and over level. Their former spots have been taken over, in the progression, by those who had been receiving less than \$8,000.

Just where they stand, currently, is brought out in a copyrighted report issued by Sales Management, Inc. details, for every section of the country, the percentage of families that fall within each income bracket.

In Colorado County, it shows, 47.9 percent of the local households had disposable incomes in the past year, after payment of their personal taxes, of \$8,000 or more.

This was a greater proportion than was found in many parts of the country. The purpose of the survey was to gain a better understanding of each community's purchasing power than was revealed solely through its average income figure.

It shows whether there are a small number of high-income families making up for a large number with small incomes or whether earnings are more equally distributed. The breakdown figures for Colorado County show that 17.0 percent of the families had incomes of \$5,000 to \$8,000 in the past year, that 11.4 percent were in the \$8,000 to \$10,000 bracket, 21.2 percent at the \$10,000 to \$15,000 level and that 15.3 percent had incomes above \$15,000. The remaining families had \$5,000 or less after taxes.

Because the survey takes into account only cash income, it does not do full justice to farm communities, where income-in-kind and lower living

costs are important factors, it is noted. Although incomes have been on the rise for most Americans, so have living expenses. Nationally, there was a net loss of nearly five percent in buying power last year.

The top quality calves only about one cent higher. The demand was excellent and the firm handled 1610 head of cattle.
