All students enrolled full-time, as of September 1975, in grades 7 through 12 in any public, private, or parochial school in the United States, its territories, a U.S. sponsored school abroad, or any school in Canada may have entries submitted by their teachers. Students in grades 7, 8, and 9 are eligible for the Junior Division; students in grades 10, 11, and 12 are eligible for the Senior Division. Students graduating from high school before 1976 are not eligible.(By Denise Wiese)
In the Senior Division, three First Awards of \$300 each, three Second Awards of \$200 each, three Third Awards of \$100 each, and ten Fourth Awards of \$50 each will be awarded. In the Junior Division, three First Awards of \$200 each, three Second Awards of \$100 each, and ten Fourth Awards of \$50 each will be awarded.(By Denise Wiese)
There are eight classifications that can be entered in the Senior Division. They are short story, short-short story, poetry, dramatic script, short informal article, feature-length article, critical review, and original song. The Junior Division has three classifications: article, poetry, and short story.(By Denise Wiese)
Entries will be judged by a distinguished group of authors, editors, and critics. Decisions will be based on originality, quality of expression, and skill in handling specific forms of writing. The decisions of the judges are final.(By Denise Wiese)
