The new state pesticide control act regulating the sale and use of pesticides was enacted to enable the state to conform to Federal regulations.

The act provides for the registration of pesticides, licensing of dealers, and testing and licensing of applicators of restricted use pesticides.

The hearing will be conducted by representatives of the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Texas Water Quality Board, the Texas Animal Health Commission and the Texas Department of Health Resources.

City Hearings On Federal Aid

The Eagle Lake City Council will hold the first of two public hearings on proposed projects under the Community Development Block Program of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday of this week.

The second meeting will be held Tuesday, Dec. 2nd in the council room of the Municipal Building.

Persons interested in future projects concerning water systems, sewerage systems, drainage, street paving, and housing are asked to attend either or both of the public hearings.

The Eagle Lake City Council plans to submit to the Community Development Block Program a request for federal funds for the extension of sewer lines in the western part of the city, in the Hubbard Ferry, Austin Road and West Main Street areas.

Earlier the city's application for some \$92,000 in assistance in the program was rejected due to non-availability of funds.

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Sheriff's Office Consol. Fund Drive For 3 Burglaries

Big Assortment Of Shotguns, Rifles, Appliances Taken

Colquhoun County Sheriff's Department was called to investigate burglaries at three homes in this county on Wednesday, Dec. 10th when burglars walked off a big assortment of shotguns, rifles, and other small appliances from the three homes.

Officers believe that the three burglaries might have been done by the same person or persons on route toward the Houston area.

At 2:00 p.m. last Wednesday the department received a call from Ervin Evans who reported that his home was burglarized. Entry was made by use of a bar, thought to be a tire tool to force entry into the home. Mr. Evans reported the following items were missing: one 12 ga. Stevens pump shotgun, one antique double barrel malle shotgun, one 410 single shot shotgun, one Remington 700 DL 270 bolt action rifle with scope and scope, one C.A.F. automatic Dual 8 movie projector, one C.A.F. Super 8 movie camera and projector. Deputies lifted some prints and these have been sent to Austin for classification and identification.

On the same afternoon, the county sheriff's office received a call from Mrs. Lloyd Turner, who resides east of Weimar that her home had been entered. Investigation showed the burglars apparently entered the house through a garage and unlocked back door. She reported the following items were missing: one 30-30 Winchester rifle, one Model A2-L Beretta shotgun, one Remington 1100 12 ga. shotgun, one 410 Model 70 No. 10 shotgun, and antique imported double barrel shotgun, one antique rifle, and one 22 caliber rifle. Deputies also lifted one go-finger print at this entry.

Sidney Fry, who lives east of Columbus on Route 2, A1-leyon, reported that a door at his home was pried open using a bar during the day Nov. 19th. He reported missing: one Remington 570 16 ga. pump shotgun, one Remington 22 pump rifle, one clock radio, one antique clock, one electric sewing machine and one Parson's double barrel shotgun. Officers continue to investigate the entries.

The sheriff's office had never had a burglary in this area until last Wednesday, Nov. 19. For the department helped a transient cyclist to recover a bicycle and gear which had been stolen in the Sheridan area when he stopped to purchase some food.
