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REFLECTIONS ON International Sunday School Lesson

(Genesis 41:4-8; 15-21)
Al Smith worked hard and had every ability necessary for success in his company. Two men above him on the corporate ladder undermined his every effort at advancement. Finally he accepted an offer from another company. After five years with the new company, he advanced to a vice presidency with every assurance that eventually he would move to the presidency. Over coffee with a friend from the first company, he was reminded of the old days there. "Actually those two men did me a favor without my realizing it," he concluded.

The experience of Joseph was much like that. He had been sold into slavery by his brothers. Then he eventually became prime minister of Egypt. When a famine in Canaan brought his brothers to Egypt to buy food, Joseph revealed who he was. His brothers were humiliated, and he killed them for not understanding why he could not take vengeance on them. His first reason was that he felt he had a mission from God to perform in Egypt. Someone has commented: "Forgiveness is hard to ask for. We always want to think that we are right about every subject. Forgiveness is also hard to give and to receive. To give it rubs cross grain with our built-in desire to hold a grudge. Receiving it makes us feel humiliated." Joseph was asked for forgiveness by his brothers who should have asked for it. Since he was the injured party, Joseph could have easily nursed a grudge. Instead, he quickly gave forgiveness.

The reason was simple. He could see the hand of God in the affairs of his life. He knew that the circumstances that men planned to injure him had actually benefited him. Even if he had not prospered financially or socially, he probably would not have been able to hold a grudge. People who see evidence of the workings of God in their lives seldom nurse grudges.

A few years after this, the father of Joseph died. The brothers of Joseph became fearful again. They felt that perhaps it was the family tie that had prevented Joseph from being vengeance. Again, Joseph declared that God had intended for him to come to Egypt. They felt that if Joseph was meant to harm them, God would have shown them. He declared that it was on the basis of a relationship to God that forgiveness and reconciliation are possible.

The New Testament understands this same concept. It tells us that we are to forgive each other, as "God for Christ's sake has forgiven us." It emphasizes that God has given us his forgiveness and takes the initiative in healing the breach between God and man. Because we are forgiven and reconciled people, we can be both forgiving and reconciling people. When God is at work in our lives, we know that the injuries other people do to us cannot permanently frustrate God's plan in our lives. For that reason, we can live without grudges and quickly offer forgiveness to those who offend us.
