Babson Business Forecast for '76

(Continued from page three)
The Babson forecast for 1976, based on the conditions and prospects over the past year, with the outlook for business, employment, and personal income, is expected to see more liberal spending on the part of consumers. In current dollars, consumer expenditures should cross the trillion-dollar mark, but high prices will temper the year-to-year improvement on a unit volume basis. Such a large part of the spending dollar will be gobbled up by hefty allocations for food, shelter, clothing, and energy that there will be scant leeway for lower priority segments.

Locked in by inflation and ever-expanding social programs, public spending at all government levels will move forward in 1976. The federal government, particularly, is saddled with prior commitments, rising mounting pressures for fiscal responsibility are not likely to do more than pare some appropriations, and force curtailment and postponement of some lavish and low-priority items. Therefore, another huge federal deficit looms for calendar 1976, despite the moderating influence of an increase in tax revenues.

BUILDING & CONSTRUCTION
After a sharp two-year slump during which the seasonally adjusted annual rate of private housing starts tumbled from 2.5 million units to somewhat less than 1 million units, an improvement in mortgage credit supplies spawned an upturn for home building in 1975. But even when the full year's total is tallied, it will be well below the 1972 record and even less than the poorest showing of recent years. Babson's forecast shows housing starts of some 1.3 million units in 1976. Nonresidential construction will also improve steadily, but the gains will not be substantial and will lend business only mild support.

Farm Projects Hinge On Carryover
1975 was a fine year for agricultural output, but farmers did not fare well in terms of income. High operating costs and the embargo on grain exports held net farm income far below expectations relative to the bumper 1975 crop. There

South Texas Nuclear Project Gets NRC OK

The South Texas Project, a nuclear electricity generating plant near Bay City in Matagorda County and a project of Central Power and Light Co., Houston Lighting and Power Co., the Cities of Austin and San Antonio, has been granted approval for construction by the U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The NRC issued a permit for the proposed 2,500-megawatt power plant, indicating approval of the safety-related design of the facility and predicted construction could begin in January.

The target date now is for Unit 1 to begin supplying nuclear-generated electricity to the system of four participating electric utilities in late 1982, with Unit 2 following in 1983.

Officials said nuclear-generated electricity should cost about one-fourth as much as electricity generated with natural gas.

Comments involved described the NRC permit as "a great step forward in moving away from scarier and more expensive natural gas and oil in the generation of electricity."

Aliens Must Register in Jan.

District Director R. W. Boston of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the period within which aliens must register their addresses is almost at hand.

The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report addresses to the Government during that period.

Heaton said that forms with which to make the report will be available at all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.
