Facts ABOUT Diabetes

1. The National Commission on Diabetes submitted its final report to Congress on December 10, 1975. The Commission was authorized by Congress in July, 1974, with the passage of the Diabetes Mallitus Research and Education Act (PL 93-354), and began its work March

2, The report of the Commission confirms Congress' finding that diabetes is a major health problem: Diabetes now affects 10 million Ameri- 4

cans - 5% of the population. . The prevalence is increasing. Between 1965 and 1973, diabetes increased by more than 50% in the United States. . Women are 50% more likely than men to

have diabetes. · Non-whites are 20% more likely whites to have diabetes.


· Poor people (incomes less than \$5,000 per year) are three times more likely than middle-income and wealthy people to have diabetes.

. The chance of developing diabetes doubles with every 20% of excess weight. . The chance of developing diabetes doubles with every decade of life.

· Diabetics are 25 times more prone to blindness than non-diabetics, 17 times more prone to kidney disease, over 5 times more prone to gangrene -- often leading to amputation -- and twice as prone to heart disease. These and other complications result in 14% of all diabetics being bedridden for an average of approxi-

mately 1 1/2 months per year. The problems are particularly acute for children suffering from juvenile onset diabetes; presently one-half of / these children die with kidney disease within an average of 25 years following diagnosis of fighetes.

3. The annual estimated cost of diabetes to the American economy is \$5.3 billion; in fiscal year 1975 only \$43 million were allocated to diabetes research programs. · Few advances have been made in treating diabetes since 1921, when insulin was discovered. Because insulin controlled the overt symptoms of the disease, it was thought to be a "cure" ...




