Year Ends With 63 Fires, 38.79 In. Rain

The year of 1975 came to a close with one additional fire to increase the total fire alarms for the year to 63, but there was no more rain as this area enjoyed beautiful mild weather during the New Year's holidays. The year ended with a total of 38.79 inches just about normal for this area, although much of the total came during the month of May when 11.55 inches were recorded. These figures were compiled at the lake plant of the Lakeside Irrigation Company and will vary slightly with the total rainfall which fell within the city limits. The final fire of the season was a grass fire at 11:40 a.m. Wed., Dec. 31st. The fire was on Keith Street in the city limits and boosted the total number of alarms in the city limits to 20 and those outside the city limits to 43. Total number of alarms answered by the Eagle Lake volunteer fire department for the year of 1975 was 63 which compares a total of 51 alarms (22 in the city and 39 out of the city) in the year of 1974.

Diabetes, A Deadly Disease, On Increase

Dexter Anderson of Eagle Lake, president of the South Texas Affiliate of the American Diabetes Association, issued a warning this week that diabetes, a deadly disease, is on the increase and efforts are being made to increase research in hopes of controlling this killer disease.

Mr. Anderson cited facts from the report of the National Commission on Diabetes, issued Dec. 10th, 1975, giving facts about this incurable and deadly disease. The report estimated that the number of victims will double in less than a generation. The report put the number of diabetics in the United States today at 10 million and the economic cost of the disease at \$5.3 billion annually.

"The average American born today has a better than one-in-five chance of developing diabetes, unless a method of prevention is found," noted Anderson.

Diabetes is a disease in which a person is either unable to make insulin - a hormone vital to the body's use of sugar - or is unable to utilize the insulin present. This results in a build-up of sugar in the blood. The disease's cause is unknown. And while insulin injections, strict diets, and drugs can control the disease's severest symptoms, diabetes remains a killer.

The National Commission's report noted that diabetes directly caused 38,000 deaths in 1974 and strong evidence exists that complications accompanying the disease now account for more than 300,000 deaths each year. This ranks diabetes third among the nation's leading causes of death, behind heart attacks and cancer.

The commission report estimates that diabetes will affect 20 million Americans by 1988.

The commission's report recommended that the Federal Government triple its spending on diabetes programs to \$125 million in fiscal 1979 from the \$43 million allocated in fiscal 1975. Most of the money could be devoted to basic research into the causes, cure, and prevention of the disease.

"The South Texas Affiliate of the American Diabetes Association invites every citizen to join in this battle against diabetes," said Anderson.
