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### In Opera House Broadway Play 1776 Planned In Columbus

Magnolia Homes Tour, Inc. of Columbus, Texas, announces that the Broadway play "1776" will be performed in the Stafford Opera House in Columbus during the annual Magnolia Homes Tour in May 1976.

### \$28,000 Insurance Dividend In County

The Veterans Administration has good news for veterans living in Colorado County.

Some \$20 of them will receive approximately \$28,000 as their share of a record payout of \$76.8 million being made to various classes of service men and women.

The payment, representing dividends declared under their GI insurance policies, is being accelerated by the government. Normally, when such dividends become available, they are paid on the anniversary dates of the policies and, as a result, stretch out over a period of 18 months.

This year, however, distribution of most of the money will be completed by the end of the month. About \$23 million of the total will be paid out by that time, according to Richard L. Roudsback, Texas, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

The dividend checks will be going only to World War veterans who served in World War II. The Korean War veterans, who participated in the Vietnam War will not share at present because of the type of insurance they held.

Most of the recipients have National Service Life Insurance, issued to those who served in World War II. The Korean War veterans who are eligible carry U.S. Government Life Insurance policies and those who served in the Korean War, Veterans Special Life Insurance.

The 300 residents of Colorado County who will be on the receiving end are those who retained their policies. They constitute about 21 percent of the World War II and Korean veterans in the local area. The total, according to the latest VA tabulation, is 1,500.

Just how much each recipient will get depends upon the size and age of his policy and the kind of insurance he holds. The general average, for those who were in the first World War, is \$184. For the World War II veterans, the average is \$1,000 and, for the others, \$14.

The VA insurance officials explain that the dividends represent returns to the policy holders of excess money that is available due to high interest rates earned by the funds and the savings realized in the purchase of a lower-than-expected death rate among veterans.

Some of the recipients will be using their money to buy additional insurance. The rest will be putting the cash to other purposes.

**Pearl Collects 556,900 Alum. Cans In Area**  
The Pearl Beer Distributing Company here collected more than 556,900 used all-aluminum beverage cans from people in this area, according to Alan Campbell, president.

At the same time, Campbell announced that used aluminum cans will be collected this year from 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. every Tuesday at his distributorship, 600 Lake-side Drive.

Last year the statewide Pearl aluminum beverage can recycling program removed over 185 million cans from the Texas environment or 71.6 percent of the brewery's aluminum beverage can production.

"We're proud of our distributor network which has made it possible for Pearl to collect 6.41 million used beverage cans in our statewide environmental program since we began in 1973," said Lee Birdsong, president of the San Antonio-based brewery.

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### Fayette Criminal Trial Moved To This County

The long-standing criminal case against Norman Cecil Donovan, killed as an habitual criminal and just for all, escape, will be transferred to Colorado County on a change of venue from 14th District Court in Fayette County last week.

Appearing before District Judge Paul Russert, the defendant refused the offer by the state of plea bargaining. Donovan and his attorneys then entered a plea for a venue change, which was granted, and the case sent to Judge E. W. Patterson's 23rd District Court in Columbus.

Donovan, 38, held as an habitual criminal and Charles Nick Davis escaped from jail in La Grange on June 19, 1972. Donovan was later recaptured at Springfield, Mo., and Davis was apprehended near West Point last summer.

Davis, meanwhile, was sentenced to prison and is now serving a 10-year term at Columbus for safekeeping, Fayette County Record.

**House Approves Emergency Project**

Last week the House approved legislation which continues funding through the transitional quarter of the Fiscal Year 1976 (July 1-Sept. 30, 1976) and for the Fiscal Year 1977 (beginning Oct. 1, 1976) for the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). The bill, called the Emergency Employment Project Act, would increase the \$300 million program for short term jobs projects, primarily in schools and non-profit hospitals.
