Mardi Gras in New Orleans, Louisiana, has become an important annual event, and that is the spot where most people congregate to celebrate Mardi Gras. Street parades began about two weeks before Mardi Gras. The parades which are called Krewe organize and pay for the parades and the other festivities which take place. The oldest and best known Krewe, which are called the Comite, were founded in 1872. During the carnival season the Krewe give balls and private parties.
