The free screening program in Eagle Lake, Thomas said. Members of the Colorado County Volunteer Emergency Ambulance Corps will take free blood pressure readings and provide information about the program and about hypertension. Registered nurses and medical students also will read blood pressures. The procedure is quick and painless.

Participants will be told the results of their readings immediately. Anyone whose systolic pressure is over 90 will be advised to consult a physician.

These standards were established by the medical staff of the Eagle Lake Community Hospital, who have endorsed the project.

Records will be considered confidential, Thomas said.

Teams of volunteers will be available on March 22, 23 and 24 to screen approximately 325 students and faculty members.

Records will be processed from Dr. Thomas' sophomore and junior health classes to have medical records checked. Participants will receive a letter regarding the government's health program.

The first screening will be held on March 22, at the homes of the membership to make preparation for spiritual renewal.
