2 Game Law Changes Aired At Hearing Wed.

Two minor changes in proposed regulations to be set by the Commission at a public hearing held in the county courthouse in Columbus on Wednesday evening of last week. Only nine persons appeared for the hearing, some made comments, and the entire meeting took less than fifteen minutes to complete. Ernest Maran of the Texas Parks and Wildlife staff conducted the hearing and he was assisted by local P-W biologist Bob Carroll and P-W game warden Leo Kohlfeil. Marsh pointed out that the final regulations will be set by the Commission at a meeting at 3 a.m. April 23rd in Austin. He reviewed two minor changes in wording in the proposed regulations. One sets out that hunting as well as killing wild game or birds on privately owned property will be an offense. In the past the law said that killing of these birds or animals only was an offense. The new addition will make it possible to make an arrest for illegal hunting before a kill is made. The other change removes the provision that sets out that seasons on all game birds and animals be closed within the corporate limits of a city.
