**MARKET REPORT**  
WHARTON CO. LIVESTOCK  
Owners reported the market was two to three cents higher on almost all classes of cattle at the Wharton County Livestock Market sale on Wed., March 31st. Slaughter cows were two to three cents higher, and good choice 300 to 400 lb. feeder steers were fully three to four cents higher. Buyer attention was reportedly good and the demand very active. The firm handled 600 head of cattle.  
Choice stocker and feeder steers in the 450 to 550 lb. group sold for 38 to 42; 500 to 600 lb. standard steers went 32 to 35 and 350 to 450 lb. choice heifers brought 30 to 33. Utility slaughter cows sold for 27 to 29 while bulls brought 34 to 36. Choice stocker cows went for \$250 to \$300 per head.
