Comm. Leyendecker Donates Gravel To Road Project

Colorado County Commissioner in Precinct 3, Crockett Leyendecker, is donating some 5500 yds. of road gravel estimated to cost over \$1800 from a gravel pit on his property in this county, for use on the Alleton - Freiburg road project in Precinct 3.

The only cost to the county will be the usual operator's fee of 80c per cubic yard. The gravel will be hauled in Precinct 3 trucks for about one mile to the road construction site.

The court expressed appreciation to Commissioner Leyendecker for his contribution to the betterment of roads in the county.

County Invests \$348,000 In CD's

Colorado County Commissioners' Court approved the investment of a total of \$348,000 in county funds in a Certificate of Deposit to draw 14.6% interest for the next 99 day period. The funds are some that will be needed later in the year and are placed in CD's to draw the 14.6% rate of interest until needed.

On April 14th a CD totaling \$203,094.62 matured after drawing \$7,230.17 in interest. Included in the CD was \$31,064 in the permanent improvement fund; \$51,780 in revenue sharing; and \$20,250 in revenue sharing; and \$20,250 in revenue sharing allocated; and \$51,780 in the officers' salary fund.

The court, in session Monday, ordered that the following funds be invested for the next 99 day period: \$51,000 in permanent improvement fund; \$25,000 in precinct 2 revenue sharing; and \$18,000 in precinct 4 revenue sharing; \$97,000 in revenue sharing unallocated; \$52,000 in the officers' salary fund; \$40,000 in road and bridge special; \$40,000 in additional ad valorem precinct 2; \$15,000 in additional ad valorem unallocated; and \$10,000 from a contingency fund.
