For suppressing red rice, Eric Crawford, Comptroller, manufacturer of Treflan, recommends using a two-year program before planting rice in the third year.

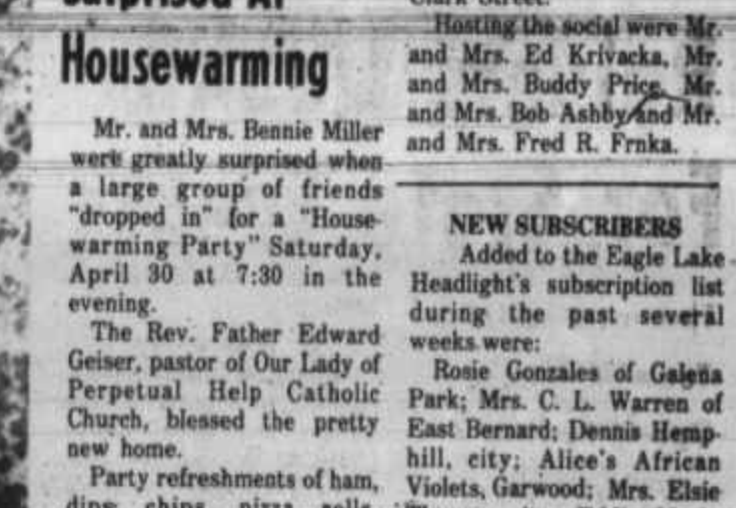
Prior to applying Treflan, Elanco advises that all existing weeds must be destroyed and crop residues thoroughly chopped and mixed into the soil four to six inches deep.

The Rev. Father Edward Geiser, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church, blessed the pretty new home.

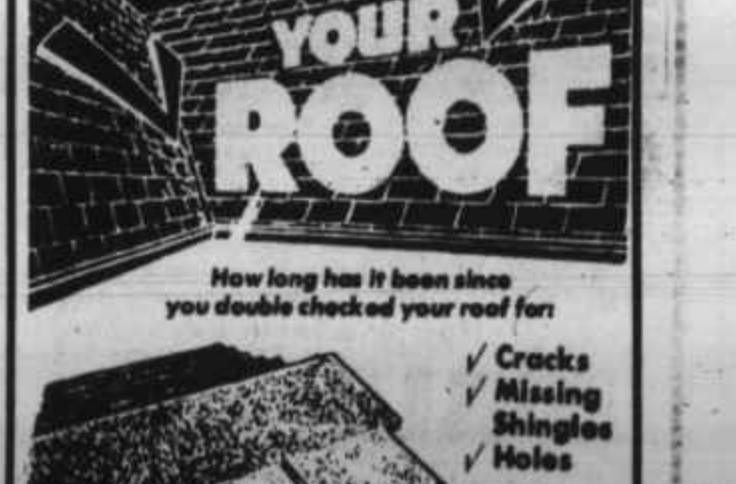
Party refreshments of ham, dips, chips, pizza rolls, trays of hors d'oeuvres and champagne punch were served.
