Among the colleges selected by the seniors, 36 indicated that they will attend Wharton County Junior College, 8 will attend Texas State Technical Institute, 6 will attend the University of Houston, 3 will attend Texas A&M and Prairie View. Navy Scholarship Offered to Jrs.

Students at Rice are now being informed of the further processing for eligibility in the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps. This is for juniors that are college oriented and explains how to apply for one of the 2,000 full scholarships available in 1977.

To be eligible for the NROTC Scholarship, a student must score a minimum of 1000 on the SAT or 23 on the ACT. He must also submit the simple application blank included in the NROTC Bulletin. If selected for a scholarship, a youngster is guaranteed a four-year scholarship to an NROTC unit at one of 38 universities listed. In all cases the Navy will pay full tuition, books, educational fees and allowances and give the recipient a \$100.00 per month stipend.

Black Poet Wins Pulitzer Prize

Gwendolyn Brooks became the first black to win the Pulitzer Prize for her poetry "Annie Allen."

Brooks was born in Topeka, Kansas on June 17, 1917. She grew up in Chicago and spent most of her life there. When she was 13 years old, she published her first poem in the Chicago Defender.

After Miss Brooks had her first book of poetry, "A Street in Bronzeville," published in 1945, she received wide critical acclaim. In 1946 and 1947 she received successive Guggenheim fellowships.

Miss Brooks won the Pulitzer Prize in 1949 for "Annie Allen," but she still hasn't quit. In 1953 she finished her first novel, "Maud Martha," the story of a Negro girl's childhood in Chicago. In 1968 she was named Poet Laureate of Illinois.

Today, if you like, you may find some of her work in "The Tiger Who Wore White Gloves," Third World, 1974 which is one of her books.

Morse Code Still in Use

On May 24, 1944, the first telegraphic message was sent by Morse Code in a message from the Supreme Court in Washington, D.C. The message was typed by Samuel B. Morse, the inventor.

The Morse Code consists of a combination of dots and dashes, which, presented in a certain arrangement, represent letters and punctuation. Morse Code is still in use today, especially in submarine cables.
