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LCRA BEGINS STUDY FOR RECREATION AREAS ALONG COLORADO RIVER

"Pocket parks" for campers, historical and nature trails in unique areas, joint recreational development and multi-use park and camping sites are among the possibilities being considered in a comprehensive study of recreation within the Lower Colorado River Authority's boundaries.

The LCRA, which is given the duty of providing public access and recreational opportunities on land it controls within its 10-county river-course district, has launched a major inquiry into the possibilities for further recreational development.

The LCRA has contracted with Texas A&M University to conduct the study, designed to produce the first overall recreational development plan made by a river authority in Texas.

With 12 public recreation areas located along the Colorado and on cooling reservoirs at its power plants, the LCRA already leads all other state river authorities in recreational opportunities.

The 12-month, \$48,000 study will include field investigation of potential recreation sites on the Colorado from San Saba County to the Gulf of Mexico, as well as surveys of lands along the Colorado's major tributaries and other areas within the district.

The investigators will compile detailed descriptions of each potential site, along with an assessment of the suitability of each for development.

LCRA Parks Planner Terry Colgan said the study will allow the river authority to assign priorities for future development in order to make the best use of recreational funds. He said the study should also provide information for use in seeking participation by other agencies in joint development projects.

The LCRA and investigators will ask for citizen opinion and suggestions on potential recreation areas through public meetings in each of the district's 10 counties.

The first of those public meetings will be held June 1st at 7:30 p.m. in the Columbus Elementary School Cafeteria for residents of Colorado County. A full schedule of the meetings—open to any interested citizen—will be announced soon, Colgan said.

Preliminary meetings were held in the Colorado County Extension Service, press and Colorado County Commissioners' Court to lay plans for the public hearings.

Colorado County Judge Lester J. Cranek and Commissioners Bill Stiles, Crockett Leyendecker and Rafael Veselka said the court would be happy to jointly sponsor the public hearings, hopes of gaining needed recreational facilities for this county.

Sam K. Seymour, Jr., LCRA director, noted that the June 1st meeting will be the first in the 10-county LCRA area and individuals, businesses and civic groups are asked to make plans to attend the meeting.

Final plans for the Bicentennial celebration to be held July 3rd and 4th will be discussed.

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Motorgrader Costs County \$33,023

Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in session Monday, approved the purchase of a new motorgrader for Commissioner Walter Henke's precinct one at a cost of \$33,023, after trade-in of a used grader.

Five firms offered bids on the motorgrader and the successful bidder was Hyco Equipment Co. of Houston which offered a John Deere motorgrader for \$42,602 but allowed \$9,579 for the trade-in of the used unit for a net price of \$33,023. Delivery was promised in 30 to 45 days.

Other bidders were: Plains Machinery of Houston which offered a Gallion grader for \$36,495 net; South Texas Equipment Co. of Houston which offered a Wabco grader for \$40,339 net; Highway Equipment Co. of Houston which offered a \$42,553 net; and Mustang Equipment Co. of El Paso which offered a Caterpillar grader for \$38,000 net.

In other action the court authorized advertisement for bids for the purchase of a new automobile for use in Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker's Precinct three office. The bids to be opened at the next term of court June 14th.

DEEDS ACCEPTED
The court accepted deeds to properties for road right of way in the Gladden area from Herbert Schroeder, Jr. One of the deeds provided an additional 20-foot right of way for a distance of 729 feet also from Highway 90 to IH 10. The other provides a 40-foot wide road right of way for a distance of 729 feet also from Highway 90 to IH 10, also in the Gladden area and about 500 feet west of the Old Army Road. The court, authorized County Attorney Jim Whitcomb to do some research to determine if the State of Texas is responsible for maintenance on portions of Farm Road 949 which have been officially dedicated to the state. Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker asked the county attorney to determine state's obligation.

He said that he had several letters from the Highway Department indicating that funds have been designated for the FM 949 work but at a cost of \$33,023, after trade-in of a used grader.

Mr. Whitcomb was at the meeting and he said that he had been in contact with the Highway Department. He said that the state now holds deeds to the road right of way.
