further asked that the board make the final decision on the matter of reorganization, rather than making it an administrative action. The second resolution set out that all persons present at the meeting pledged unanimously to support whatever decision was taken by the board on the matter of reorganization.

Billy Heber, a former Rice High School teacher, said that "we have a great district in the Rice District. Let's keep it great by keeping our priorities in proper order."

Mrs. Marsha Friesmeyer said she was speaking as a teacher and concerned citizen and predicted that the combination of grades would double a teacher's problems, adding that her observations would substitute teaching were that teachers have enough problems with discipline and organizing classes with students of one grade only.

Mrs. Kathy Labay noted that "it is important to keep in mind that the foundation of education is formed in the first four grades."

W. R. Martin and Mrs. Ann Zbrank also had requested to speak but, passing, commenting that their remarks would be repetitive. Mrs. Zbrank later told the board that the Garwood citizens voted for consolidation, "because we believed education would advance. Betterment of education for every individual child in our system was the aim of consolidation, nothing less should be our goal."

Cons Presented, Too
Supt. E. A. Krivacka spoke briefly in behalf of the administrative decision to combine the lower four grades at the Garwood school under two teachers. He said, "Quality education was one of the major considerations at the time of our decision to combine the grades," he commented. At the May 10th meeting he pointed out that enrollment at Garwood has dropped in the past few years to a point where there are only about a dozen students in each of the lower four grades. He said a combination of the first and second grades would result in a class of about 24 students and a combination of third and fourth grades would result in a class of 25 to 26 students.

Mrs. Vera Brown, recently appointed as the Garwood reading coordinator, told the gathering Monday night that in her opinion the planned reorganization should improve reading programs. She noted that research shows that a room should have at least 20, but not more than 26 students in a grade room. She proposed that the larger classes will give teachers an opportunity to have a wider spread of planned organization and "the children would have more opportunity to learn from others as well as from their teachers."

"No research that I have been able to locate shows that a smaller group makes for a higher education. It helps the teacher, perhaps, but not the children," added Mrs. Brown. "In a larger class the faster learners would have more opportunity to advance and the slower learners would learn from those who are more advanced."

She concluded that no program would be effective however without the cooperation of the teacher and the parents. "It is my belief that the larger classes will be up to the teachers to make it work."

Board member Anthony Kallina, of Garwood, asked the group if they were proposing that the smaller class groups become a philosophy of the board for use district-wide. Hefer responded saying, "It is our
