**Memorial Day Still Celebrated**

Memorial Day got started when in May, 1865, Adjutant General Chapman of the Grand Army of the Republic suggested to General John Logan, the commander in chief, that arrangements be made for the soldiers to decorate the graves of the deceased Union soldiers on a uniform day in any of the states until 1873 when the veterans in New York succeeded in persuading the legislature to pass an act designating the thirtieth of May, to be known as Decoration Day, as one of the public holidays for all purposes whatsoever as regards the transaction of business in the public offices of the state.

The naval regulations provide for a suspension of all drills and exercises on the day and the firing of a salute of twenty-one guns by all ships in commission and at all naval stations during which the engine is to be at half mast.

The custom of decorating the graves of the dead with flowers is of great antiquity, and it was adopted as a matter of course for Memorial Day.

This holiday is a very special one. It commemorates the death of the men and women who fought for what they believed in for their country, the United States of America.
