Martin Sues Nada Firm For Damages

The funds will be placed in the airport trust fund for improvements in the airport area and for recreation facilities.

The council had a long discussion with a representative of the Bernard Johnson Engineering firm relative to progress on the city's application for funds from the Environmental Protection Agency for fund assistance for the future construction of a new sewer plant for this city. More details on this will be given in the next issue of the Headlight.

Also present at the meeting was Certified Public Accountant William Pierce Arthur of Columbus who presented the annual audit of funds for the year ending March 31st, 1976. Due to the limited amount of time the council had to study the audit, final acceptance was delayed until the next meeting June 8th. More information on the audit report will be published in next week's paper.
