Thursday Last Day To Register For WCJC Classes

Thursday, June 3 is the last day to register or add courses for the first six weeks of summer classes at Wharton County Junior College in Wharton. All courses are held in the mornings leaving afternoons open to students who are employed or wish to be free from classes.

Micronutrient Study Part Of Rice Field Day

Final exams are July 9 and the second six weeks of summer classes convene July 12 through August 19.

Just what effect micronutrients have on rice production remains somewhat of a mystery. So, a field demonstration is underway in Wharton County to determine if micronutrients will increase yields at an economical level.

The demonstration plot will be viewed during the Western Rice Belt Field Day and Tour set for June 21. Field day headquarters will be the El Campo High School, with tours conducted during the early afternoon followed by a program and barbecue.

Heading up the micronutrient work is John Box, associate agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Box has worked with Wharton County Extension Agent Henry Smith in setting up the demonstration on the J. J. Hill Farm about 10 miles northwest of El Campo.

The demonstration site is about one-half mile south of the intersection of Farm Roads 1300 and 1160. The surface soil on the site was removed during a land leveling operation.

The demonstration features three treatments: 500 pounds per acre, ferrous sulfate (30 per cent iron) at 300 pounds per acre, and a combination of the two at those rates. Both materials were incorporated into the soil prior to planting.

Other demonstrations dealing with both rice and soybeans are being conducted in Wharton County and deal with seed treatment, weed and disease control. A soybean variety test is also being planned along with a bird control demonstration in rice; a fertilizer spreader efficiency test, and a study on the use of phosphorus. A number of these will be viewed during the upcoming field day.

compared to 1966 in April 1975. Convictions also registered a 17 percent increase from 1,142 to 1,341.

Led by a whopping 56 percent increase in safety-related violations, categories covered range from illegal harvesting of game animals to fishing without a license.

Sport and commercial fishing violations, pollution, water safety and park and miscellaneous violation categories all registered increases. Only game law violations decreased slightly, from 17 reported arrests in April 1965 to 163 for April of this year.
