Texas Agriculture Has Stake In International Trade

No state has a greater stake than Texas in the maintenance of high volume international trade.

That quote is the opinion of Dr. Tyrus R. Timm of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who says the importance of exports tied nearly into observance of World Trade Week May 16-22 in the United States.

Timm, close observer of European economic conditions and institutions in seven study trips abroad during the last 15 years, is research economist for the Experiment Station. He also is a Professor Emeritus in the A&M University College of Agriculture.

Timm pointed to President Ford's recent statement that "America's performance in the world market place is a true measure of the quality of American products, the extent of American ingenuity, and the dedication of American labor and industry to international commerce."

And Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butte, Timm added, has announced that "Agricultural exports have assumed an importance to farmers and to the nation that has never been equaled in this country."

The Experiment Station economist said U.S. agricultural exports reached \$22 billion in 1975 and could be even larger in 1976.

Focusing on Texas, Timm said farms and agribusinesses in the agricultural industry are geared for a large share of their production to go overseas. So if the export market should dry up, it would be difficult to estimate the financial loss to Texas agriculture and the state's overall economy.

The state ranks third for exports from Texas have peaked at \$17.7 billion in 1974. Volume was down some last year, but exports are expected to hit the 1974 level in 1976.

Texas cotton, hides and skins, and land and tallow exports top all other states. Rice and cottonseed products in Texas are second on the export list.

The state ranks third for meats and meat products, and for peanuts and peanut oil. In total farm exports, Texas is fourth, slightly behind Nebraska, and also fourth in feed grains and products, fruits and preparations, and flax seed and products.

A crucial issue, Timm says, is that about two-thirds of Texas' agricultural exports are cotton, wheat, rice and feed grains—crops chronically overproduced for domestic use. Texas farmers and consumers benefit from high agricultural production, but such output can't be kept without and expanding foreign outlets.

Considering that Texas agriculture is becoming more commercialized and efficient—and more risky—Timm says export policies should become high priority. Commodity marketing abroad also must be supplemented by broad trade rules established by government.

"Only then, and with adequate research to guide all action, will exports grow on a sustainable foundation," he said. "We either will see that this is done or suffer damaging, irreparable financial losses in the markets abroad."

are prohibited from making, extending or renewing any loan on a property in a flood-prone area, unless the property is covered by flood insurance.
