Brenda Kallina, W. D. White Attend Symposium

Over sixty South Texas science students and teachers learned about continuing fusion research at the University of Texas at Austin.

While attending the 16th Annual Nuclear Science Symposium, held June 1-4, the participants learned about the Texas Tokamak, a fusion research project located at the university. Those attending from South Texas were sponsored by Central Power and Light Company, which joined with nine other investor-owned electric companies in Texas, from the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

Dr. W. E. Drummond, a leading nuclear physicist, said that nuclear fusion, which is the joining together of light atoms to form heavier ones, may someday be the source of fuel for electric generation. Man's efforts to control fusion, responsible for the energy generation in the sun and stars, is becoming a reality, he said.

The 500 students and teachers attending the annual conference assumed roles of nuclear scientists for almost a

week. They worked on complicated math and physics problems, and attended lectures and participated in basic nuclear research.

The students attending the conference were chosen by participating schools on the basis of scholarship in science.

Dr. Pfannstiel New Director of Extension Service

Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel has been named director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System's public service agency which provides agricultural, home-making, 4-H and consumer assistance to thousands of Texans throughout the state.

Pfannstiel's appointment was made by the Texas A&M University System board of Regents, subject to concurrence of the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

The 2,000 employee service, which operates offices in all but two of Texas' 254 counties, is a joint county-state federal program, which

has traditionally served farmers, ranchers, and residents of rural communities and is becoming increasingly popular with urban dwellers.

Pfannstiel, 48, has served the Texas Agricultural Extension service for 27 years, as associate director since 1971. He joined the Extension Service upon graduation in 1949 from Texas A&M. He worked his way up through the ranks, from assistant county agent in Wharton County to county agent in Matagorda County in 1962, to administrative assistant at the service's College Station headquarters in 1966 and to assistant director in 1969.

He succeeds Dr. H.O. Kunkel, Texas A&M's dean of agriculture, who has served as the Extension Service's acting director since February when Dr. John E. Hutchins retired as director of the largest state Extension Service in the nation.

In the early days of the goose and duck hunting industry on a commercial basis in Eagle Lake, Jimmy was one of the founders of the Blue Goose Hunting Club and later formed the J. R. (Jimmy) Reel Hunting Club which annually accommodates hundreds of duck hunters from over the nation with some of the finest hunting facilities and personnel available in this area.

Nationally Known One of his chief claims to fame was his great ability in calling ducks and geese. He competed as an amateur in duck calling contests and always was an impressive participant. He later served as a judge in numerous calling contests both in this state and others.

Through his fish hatchery, he was one of the proponents of catfish farming programs in the state and was a former director for the Catfish Farmers of America organization.

He was united in marriage with Miss Lucille Hough of Lissie on June 15, 1940 and she has worked, fished and hunted side by side with Jimmy through the years.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Lucille Hough Reel; four daughters, Mrs. T. P.
