John Moore Graduate Of Naval Academy

John S. Moore, 22, son of Mayor and Mrs. Elmer A. Struss of Eagle Lake, Texas, has been commissioned an ensign and received a Bachelor of Science degree upon graduation from the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. last week.

As a midshipman at the Academy, he underwent four years of extensive study of engineering, mathematics, physical and marine sciences, management and government. In addition to an active physical fitness curriculum, he studied military history, leadership and Naval justice, and completed a variety of elective courses leading to his baccalaureate.

Summer programs provided him with an opportunity to gain professional experience aboard naval vessels and at Navy and Marine Corps shore installations. During training cruises, he received practical instruction in basic seamanship, navigation, ordnance and gunnery, and communications. He participated in battle drills and learned to control and fire shipboard weapons.

He is a 1972 graduate of Rice Consolidated High School, Altair, Tex. Mayor and Mrs. Struss were in Annapolis for the graduation and commissioning ceremonies.

Ensign Moore was selected for further study at the Academy in the field of Nuclear Power. This study will be over a year and one-half and will be at several Naval facilities in the States. Less than fifteen per cent of the 800-plus graduating midshipmen were accepted for study in the nuclear field.

DISEASE CONTROL TOPIC AT JUNE 24 RICE FIELD DAY

Diseases continue to rob rice producers of extra profits each year, and work is under way to do something about this problem.

Field demonstrations have been established on rice disease control at several locations in Wharton County, and the results of these will be discussed at the Western Rice Belt Field Day and Tour in El Campo on June 24. The tour will begin at the El Campo High School at 2 p.m. and will feature demonstration work not only on disease control but on other phases of rice and soybean production. Following the tour will be a program and barbecue.

The rice disease control studies are under the direction of Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He has been working with Wharton County Extension Agent Henry Smith in setting up demonstrations on the Delbert Swanson, J.J. Hill and John W. Winters farms.

According to Walla, the demonstration on the Swanson Farm features large seed treatment plots using the fungicides Difolatan, Vitarox, Tercrostat-1205 and Orthocide to control seedling disease and brown leafhopper.

The treatments are on the LaBelle variety seeded at the rate of 11 pounds per acre on April 3. Stand counts were made on April 26, with significantly better stands obtained with the Difolatan and Vitarox treatments. Evaluation of the fungicides for controlling brown leafhopper will be made later.

On the Hill and Winters farms, large aerial applications of the fungicides Hinosan and Benlate will be made soon to study their effect on controlling rice blast, stem rot and panicle blight. Several experimental foliar fungicides will also be evaluated on a small plot basis on the Hill Farm to determine their effectiveness in controlling these three diseases.

A special field day committee will soon be selecting particular demonstrations that will be featured during the tour. In addition to the disease control work, other demonstrations that have been established deal with weed control in rice and soybeans, soybean varieties, bird control in rice, use of phosphorus and micro-nutrients in rice, and a check on fertilizer spreader efficiency.
