State H. S. Rodeo Underway

The 1976 State Championship High School Rodeo is being held in Hallettsville's 5000-seat arena Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, June 15-19. A greater rodeo than ever is due rodeo fans.

There will be night performances only each evening, at 8 p.m.

Admission prices are as follows: Box Seats \$2.50; General Admission, Adults \$2.00, and children \$1.00, and season tickets are available (all five nights).

There will be no parade this year during the rodeo, but a big parade is being planned for the morning of June 26th in Hallettsville during the Bicentennial Celebration.

This year's rodeo will feature a higher standard of competition. Only regional champions will compete in this year's rodeo. In the past years the rodeo was open to all comers, beginning, etc. Franklin Hlavac, state national director, said the contestants in the 1976 rodeo will be winners from eight regions in the state. Each region will send its top four contestants in each event. There will be no elementary division this year. Hlavac said this level of competition was eliminated to comply with National High School Rodeo rules.

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WCEC Members Hear Reports At Annual Meet

The members, directors, and employees of Wharton County Electric Cooperative, Inc., were informed, and entertained at their 38th Annual Meeting which was held Wednesday, June 9 at the El Campo High School Auditorium.

The word educated is in reference to the report given by F. N. Stubbs, General Manager. Stubbs, who has been appointed as a member of a legislative subcommittee by Representative Tom Uher and Speaker Bill Clayton, reported on the increasing problems of rising natural gas prices. In his 1972 annual report Stubbs indicated that gas prices could reach 32 cents/MCF within the next few years. "I foresee the problem, but not the magnitude," he said. The price is now approaching \$2/MCF. Stubbs stated Wednesday night that with the help and cooperation of all members something could and would be done about this problem.

Arvid Schoenberg, President of the Board of Directors for WCEC informed the members of the past year's happenings at the Cooperative. "Although bills were still rising, not all was bad at the Cooperative as the lignite generating plant planned for 1980 is on schedule," he said. Until its completion, all must deal with the cost of gas as well as the new Utility Commission which involves the Cooperative in much reporting and hearings.

John Henry Faulk, Guest Speaker, did indeed entertain approximately 1,000 in the audience with his witty remarks and humorous dialogue. He touched the hearts of many and brought to realization that we are people with rights of our own, guaranteed to us as citizens of the United States. We run the Government; the Government does not run us.

Contract Let For New Type Hiway Striping

The placement of a different type of highway edge stripe was planned at a pre-construction meeting held at 3:00 p.m. in Yookum on June 8. A contract was recently awarded by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to the Pav-Mark Corporation of Miami, Florida at an amount of \$401,741.73. The work is financed by Federal Highway Traffic Law funds which by law can be used only for the marking of major highways.

Ben W. Bohuslav, local Traffic Engineer, explained that the process consists of the application of a tough plastic material, heated to its liquid form, and then reflective glass beads. The initial application is more expensive than common paint stripe but it lasts much longer and is more visible to the motorist, especially at night. Bohuslav said. This contract requires the placement of edge lines on both sides of 343.6 miles of highway.

James M. Ferguson, the Department's Resident Engineer in Wharton County, will be in charge of the work over the eight counties involved. The counties included are Calhoun, 29,729 miles; Colorado, 47,138 miles; DeWitt, 11,919 miles; Fayette, 35,124 miles; Gonzales, 11,673 miles; Jackson, 33,719 miles; Victoria, 77,052 miles; and Wharton, 97,252 miles.
