Each attendant carried a bouquet of yellow roses, statice, ivy and plumosa caught with imported yellow silk grosgrain ribbon. The bouquets were designed with a slight cascade of roses and fern.

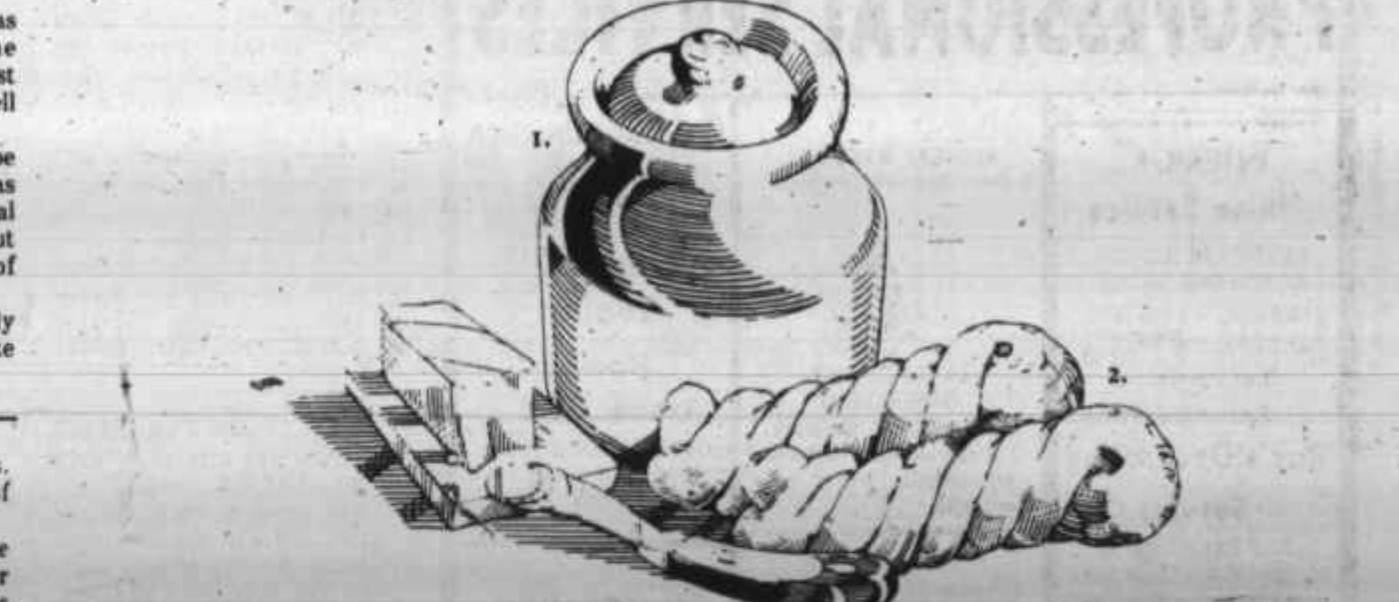

1 package active dry yeast (2 1/4 cups warm water) (105° to 115°)
1 cup instant nonfat dry milk
2 tablespoons sugar
1 cup warm water
1 (105° to 115°)
1 cup Sourdough Starter (see Recipe No. 1)
2 cups all-purpose flour
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
2. SOURDOUGH BREAD STICKS
1 cup instant nonfat dry milk
1 cup warm water
1 (105° to 115°)
1 cup Sourdough Starter (see Recipe No. 1)
2 cups all-purpose flour
3 tablespoons vegetable oil

a. Mix dry milk, water, Sourdough Starter and 2 cups flour in non-metallic bowl. Cover loosely. Let stand in warm place until mixture is coarse and bubbly, at least 8 hours.

b. 1/4 cup oil, sugar and baking soda into sourdough mixture. Stir in enough of the remaining flour to make dough easy to handle. Knead dough lightly on well-floured board about 2 minutes.

c. Roll dough into rectangle, 15 x 10 inches on well-floured board. Cut into 16 strips 1/2 inch wide. Roll each strip into even round strand about 14 inches long. Double strands over. Roll flat to form bread stick. Place bread sticks on greased baking sheet. Brush with melted butter. Cover with plastic wrap. Let rise in warm place until double, 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

d. Heat oven to 375. Bake bread sticks until golden brown, 30 to 35 minutes. Makes 15.
