

Soybean Study To Be Feature Of Field Day

Soybean producers in the Gulf Coast area will have an opportunity to learn more about soybeans during the upcoming Western Rice Belt Field Day and Tour in El Campo this Thursday.

Field demonstrations are being conducted in Wharton County on soybean varieties as well as on soybean weed control and the use of seed inoculants. These are under the direction of Dr. Arlen Klotzbocker, area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with assistance provided by Wharton County Extension agent Henry Smith.

Information on the soybean demonstrations along with information on rice demonstrations will be presented during the field tour which begins at 2 p.m. at the El Campo High School. A program and barbecue will follow.

Soybean variety demonstrations are set up on the J. Hill Farm northwest of El Campo on Farm Road 1300, and on the Wiesner Brothers Farm south of Hill off Farm Road 141. The plots range from one to two acres in size and include the varieties,

McNair 800, Coker 338, Hutton, Bragg, Tracy and Davis.

According to Klotzbocker, weed control demonstrations have been established on the Gary Wendel Farm south of Louise off Farm Road 647 and on the Henderson Farms off U.S. Highway 59 in the southwest outskirts of El Campo. The Wendel Farm features demonstrations using Treflan incorporated preplant and the use of the herbicides Lorox, Modown and Sincor or Elzone as pre-emergence weed control measures. In addition, Basagran will be demonstrated as a post-emergence weed control technique.

Only pre-emergence weed control demonstrations have been established on the Henderson Farms. These include the use of the herbicides Lorox, Suplan, Dyanap and Modown.

As far as seed treatment work is concerned, a demonstration has been set up on the Wendel Farm comparing the use of a granular inoculant to the conventional method of treating soybean seed.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purposes of the Girls State program are to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to learn together as a self governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by assuming the duties of city, county and state officials as stipulated by the Texas Legislature. Each year citizens are selected at local levels and sent to the state level where they will spend their junior year in high school. The selection is based principally on leadership, character and scholarship. The 1976 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of ninety-four girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year 508 girls were in attendance, making a total of more than 12,000 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Chief Justice Joe Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State Monday, June 14, in the Rotunda of the State Capitol. One of the highlights of the session which began June 8 and ended June 18 was the selection of three outstanding citizens of 1976 who will be sent to Girls Nation in Washington, D. C. also sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. There the three young representatives will continue their study in responsibilities of the Republic.

Attending from Eagle Lake were Barbara Baker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Baker, who served as Councilman, Place 3 in City I; and Judy Spates, daughter of Mrs. Joyce Person, who served as Tax Assessor and Collector in a Justice County. Both are seniors at Rice High School and were sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary No. 251 of El Campo. Eagle Lake Rotary Club and Garwood Lions Club provided funds for the Girls State candidates.

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Rice Field Day at Beaumont July 7

Visitors to the annual Rice Field Day at Beaumont on July 7 will have an opportunity to observe a wide variety of research efforts during morning tours at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Beaumont.

Field Day activities will carry out the theme of America's Bicentennial Year, Dr. Julian P. Craigmiles, resident director for research with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, has announced.

In keeping with the theme, tour visitors will observe a field plot of the old rice variety, "Rexora," grown under the culture system of 50 years ago with little or no chemicals. Adjacent to this historic plot will be a contrasting plot of the latest released variety, "Lebonnet," which will feature the most modern rice management system, said Craigmiles.

"Six Decades of Rice Research in Texas," a comprehensive monograph with 15 authors contributing, will be given a first showing by Dr. Jarvis E. Miller, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the state's agricultural research agency.

This will be the Beaumont Center's contribution to America's Bicentennial celebration, noted Craigmiles.

MARKET REPORT

Columbus Livestock Commission Co. handled 637 head of cattle at the sale last Thursday with the market remaining steady on most classes of cattle, except that cows were slightly weaker but well in line with the major markets.

Good to choice butcher calves sold 35 to 41, heavier packer cows brought 28 to 30, commercial packer bulls went 32 to 36, Heavy Hereford and Angus steer calves sold 38 to 45 and heifers 32 to 37, Good stocker cows and heifers brought \$180 to \$250. Butcher hogs sold 47 to 51 and lambs 30 to 40.

Wharton Livestock Co.

The market was about steady with the previous week's sale on all classes of cattle at the market sale of Wharton County Livestock Market on June 18th. The firm handled 700 head of cattle, 100 choice stockers and feeder steers in the 450 to 550 lb. range sold for 41 to 42 while 500 to 600 lb. standard steers brought 33 to 37. Choice heifers weighing 350 to 450 lbs. went for 34 to 37 and utility slaughter cows sold for 28 to 30.5 while bulls brought 34 to 37. Choice stocker cows went for \$250 to \$300 per head.
