42 Expected To Die During July 4 Weekend

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said that indications are that some 42 persons will be killed in Texas traffic accidents during the Fourth of July weekend, and called upon Texas drivers to "prove our estimate is too high."

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said his department expects "unusually heavy traffic" throughout the state, especially around recreational areas and where Bicentennial celebrations are scheduled.

He said the estimate covers a 78-hour period which starts at 6 p.m. Friday and continues until midnight Monday, July 5th.

During a comparable period last year, the department estimated that 54 persons would be killed during the holiday period. At the conclusion of the July 4th holiday last year, statewide statistics indicated 44 lives lost and rose to 49 with late reports.

Farmers To Make Acreage Reports In July

Connie Fair, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at the Columbus Field Office, wants to remind everyone that in early July about 24,700 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from W. H. Walther, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals.

This survey is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Bicentennial Rice Plot

The Beef Research and Information Act follows in the footsteps of similar programs for cotton, potatoes, wheat, and eggs. The new law authorizes cattle producers to finance their own nationally coordinated research and information program to improve, maintain, and develop markets for cattle, beef and beef products.

Financing would come from assessments of up to one-half of one percent of the value of each animal slaughtered, with provisions for a refund to producers not wishing to take part in the program.

Beaumont Rice Field Day July 7 Features Bicentennial Plots

A "Bicentennial Rice Plot" will be seen at Field Day at the Texas A&M Agricultural Center in Beaumont next Monday, July 7th, when the old variety, Rexoro, is compared to the newest long grain variety, Lebonnet. Both varieties were drilled at the seeding rate of 100 pounds per acre on April 28. Rexoro has been managed as it was in the old days—no herbicide, insecticide or fungicide. It is being fertilized with 33 pounds of nitrogen. Lebonnet has included the latest recommended cultural practices including preplant, carbofuran and Benlate plus 120-40-0 fertilizer.

Rexoro was introduced from the Philippines in 1911. Lebonnet was developed and released at Beaumont in 1974. Rexoro matures in 170 days; Lebonnet in 128 days; Rexoro reaches a height of 54 inches; Lebonnet 45 inches. Rexoro cannot be second cropped; Lebonnet can. Rexoro has a gold hull; Lebonnet a straw colored hull. The expected yield of Rexoro is 2500 lbs/acre; Lebonnet 5300 lbs/acre.

A new and first comprehensive Rice Bulletin written by the Beaumont Center Staff entitled "Six Decades of Rice Research in Texas," will make its debut at the Rice Field Day Wednesday, July 7. Filled with striking color photographs of insects, diseases and weeds that damage rice, a complete history and review of Texas rice research is presented. Jarvis Miller, Director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will make the "first showing." This should be a valuable publication that every rice producer will want to own.
