Arrangements of greenery marked family pews. Guests registered in the vestibule at an eyelet covered table holding the bride's book and an arrangement in mixed peach tones.

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\$12 Million Spent By Hungry Folks

For most Colorado County families, incomes were up in the past year and the rise was reflected in the amount of business done by local retail stores.

According to a new market report, consumer outlays for goods and services in the local area compared favorably with expenditures made in the previous year. To a considerable extent, however, inflation contributed to the increase in the dollar volume.

The findings are contained in a study just released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It shows just how much was spent locally and in other sections of the country for food, cars, clothing, furniture and general merchandise.

In Colorado County, a large part of the outlay was for food. Out of every dollar spent in local retail stores, approximately 27 cents went to supermarkets, bakeries, butcher shops, grocery stores, delicatessens and the like.

Elsewhere in the United States, 21 cents was so spent.

This was solely for take-home food. It does not include the amount spent in restaurants and in other eating and drinking places.

If the expenditures were to be divided equally among the local population they would average out to \$2,970 per household.

Stronger consumer buying was also in evidence in other local stores, the report shows.

Sales of automobiles, trailers, motorcycles, boats and other automotive equipment reached \$10,608,000. Furniture and home furnishings establishments accounted for \$738,000.

Apparel and specialty shops, including those selling hats, dresses, coats, shoes and other articles of clothing, had a gross of \$1,156,000. Furniture and home furnishings establishments accounted for \$738,000.
