Get Information Before Cashing Personal Checks

I would like to remind all our citizens who accept checks to be extremely careful. Everyone cashing a check, or receiving one for service or merchandise, should require the party making the check to put their address, telephone number, driver's license number, and date of birth on the check. Without this information it is getting harder every day to locate anyone who resides away from our County. Warrants for persons out of county which have been received by the Sheriff's Office and returned unserved if the information is not on the check. Protect yourself by requiring all this information before accepting a check. With this type of information, the chances of recovering your money, should a check be returned, is very good.

We handled 35 prisoners in the County Jail this month.

Tuesday night spoke out in support of the position that violations of the law should be handled on an equal basis without preferential treatment to anyone.

The two city patrolmen pointed out that the vehicle was not stopped merely for illegally discharging fire-works in the city limits, but that other more serious charges against state laws could have been filed. It was then that they asked the council to determine if they should or should not proceed with the charges. The councilmen generally expressed the opinion that it was not the council's prerogative to interfere in the handling of such matters and that it was a decision to be made by the police chief and if a complaint follows, that it should come to the council through proper channels, through the city manager, the mayor and then the council, if necessary.

The matter was closed with the passage of the resolution commending the officers, both local and state officers who assisted, for handling of the situation and for the actions taken. No indication was given by the police officers present whether they will or will not pursue due process of law against the alleged offenders.

The resolution adopted by the council read as follows: Whereas, the City of Eagle Lake is fortunate to have a dedicated police force to uphold and defend its laws and its citizens; and Whereas, the responsibility of the police force is sometimes complex and difficult, and Whereas, the decisions of the police force are often questioned by those who do not understand all the problems. Now, therefore, be it resolved that the City Council go on record as commending the police officers, both city

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County's Oil Production More Significant Than Ever Before

As an era of cheap energy and energy independence faded for America, Colorado County's 1975 crude oil and natural gas production became more significant to Texas and the United States than at any time since production began in 1932.

With its production marketed for a record \$40.2-million and an industry payroll totaling \$3.1-million, petroleum continued as an important factor in the economic health of the county, according to a study by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Jack S. Blanton, Houston independent oil company executive and president of the Association, said increased prices, caused by the growing shortage of domestic oil and gas, has given a multi-billion dollar boost to the economy of Texas and the state's treasury.

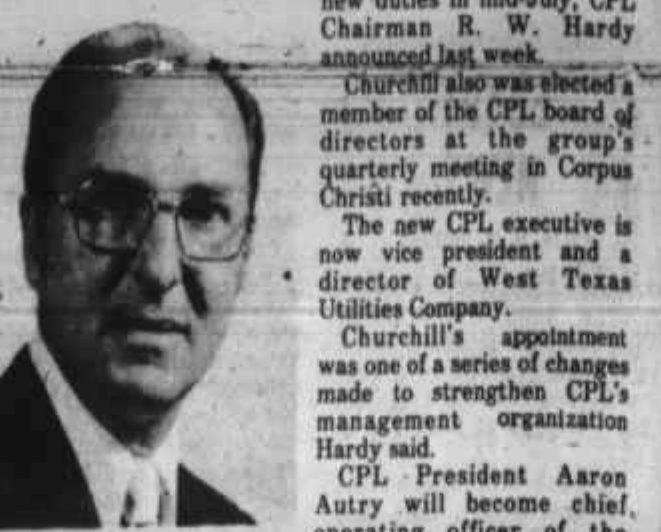
The average cost of drilling a well in Texas has jumped from \$55,000 in 1962 to \$137,000 last year, a 150-percent increase and one of the reasons why 25-cent gasoline and low utility bills are relics of the past, Blanton said.

Colorado was one of 200 Texas counties which produced oil and gas with a market value in excess of \$100,000 last year, an increase of three over the 1974 total and seven more than in 1973. The county ranked 72nd in the state in the total value of petroleum produced, realizing \$5.9-million from the sale of 751,900 barrels of crude oil; \$34.3-million from the sale of 69.9-million MCF of natural gas. The county's royalty owners last year received \$5-million.

In addition to paying local school and county property taxes, county producers also contributed to the support of state government with production payments totaling \$2.9-million-\$271,165 paid on oil output, \$2.6-million on gas production.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 330 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1975. But because oil and gas production and processing operations require such extensive support from service and supply firms, these direct employment figures are only a part of the story of the industry's impact on the local economy.

The industry's search for oil and gas continued in Colorado County, with oil and gas developers last year

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Extras Needed For Movie In Astrodome

An action-filled, star-studded television motion picture, "The Women in Box 359", is being filmed in Houston this month and more than 45,000 local persons are needed as "extras" for the gigantic production of a mock World Series baseball game to be staged July 22, July 23 and July 24, in the greatest stadium of all—the Astrodome.

Filed by ABC Circle Films, veteran production company of successful television movies, including the Emmy Award-winning "Eleanor and Franklin", the new adventure-drama is based on a series of plots revolving around seven women and four men whose lives converge during the suspenseful final games of the World Series between the Houston Astros and the Oakland A's. It stars Janet Leigh, Michael Parks, Linda Day George, Karen Valentine, Larry Mann and Bruce Boxlender.

In addition to the Astrodome, filming will be done at such Houston-area locations as Sam Houston Park, various hospitals and freeways and the Warwick Hotel starting July 19.
