He has been helping Schulenburg with its present landfill and would continue to help with a joint project, Schulenburg City Manager Sam Barrington said.

## Last Rites For Mrs. Charles Walker

Former Garwood Resident Dies In Sweeney Wed.

One of the most beloved residents of the Sweeney community and a former resident of the Garwood area, Mrs. Charles Walker, age 47, succumbed to a long illness and died in the Sweeney Community Hospital last Wednesday, July 21st.

Known to friends affectionately as Ann, she had a distinguished role in church, civic and community life and was singled out as one of the Sweeney community's most outstanding citizens. Her passing brought great sadness to her friends in that area and to other relatives and friends in this area where she spent her childhood years.

Mrs. Mary Ann Walker was placed to a final resting place in the Sweeney Cemetery last Friday afternoon, July 23rd following funeral services in the First Methodist Church of Sweeney. Officiating at the services was the Rev. Dan Bynum, pastor. Serving as pallbearers were: Edward Farmer, Phillip O'Patrick, B. R. Roesler, S. E. Updike, I. H. Buller, Frank M. Burtschell, Bobby Nairn and Maxey Brooke. Sweeney Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Walker was the daughter of Mrs. O. C. Braden and the late Mr. Braden and spent her childhood years in Garwood and graduated from Garwood High School. Her father was employed for many years with the Lehr interests in Garwood before his retirement. He died in February of this year.

Mary Ann was very active in her church, having taught both adult and children's classes, and she was a past member of the Sweeney Home Demonstration Club, the Sweeney Garden Club and was a worker in the American Cancer Society.

Surviving are her husband, Charles E. Walker, (son of Mrs. Will Walker) formerly of this city. The family resided, following their marriage in San Marcos and Nada before moving to Sweeney where he has been associated with Phillips Petroleum Co. for many years. Also surviving are a son, David E. Walker, who is serving with the United States Navy aboard the U. S. S. Midway; a daughter, Mary Elizabeth Walker of Sweeney; and her mother, Mrs. Mary Braden, also of Sweeney. She was also preceded in death by a sister, Mrs. J. Olla Graves.

Mrs. Walker was known for her kindness which were demonstrated in so many ways. Although her last days were sad ones for the family, she continued to display the friendly smile and cheerful disposition that were her trademark and won for her the highest esteem among all who came to know and to love her.

A large number of relatives and friends from Eagle Lake, Garwood and Nada and surrounding areas were in Sweeney to attend the services.

FARM WEATHER OUTLOOK THROUGH FRIDAY: Fair to partly cloudy conditions are forecast for the Texas Rice Belt this week. No rain is indicated but isolated afternoon showers are common this time of year. Little change in temperature is expected.

PAST WEATHER: Rainfall over the weekend was mostly light and scattered. Beaumont, however, reported 2.75 inches of rainfall during the 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. Sunday morning. Temperatures were mostly in the mid to upper 90's Sunday afternoon and slightly lower along the coast. Minimum temperatures ranged from 70 degrees to 80 degrees.

FIELD WORK, HAYING AND HARVESTING: Rice, sorghum and melon harvest should make good progress this week with few weather caused delays. Warm temperatures and lower relative humidity should allow proper curing of hay. Farmers may want to consider cutting hay this week while chances of rain are low.

PEANUT LEAF SPOT: Weather conditions have been favorable for the rapid development of peanut leaf spot and will continue favorable through Friday.

APPLICATION OF AGRICULTURAL CHEMICALS: Conditions should be favorable for spraying and dusting crops this week. Light winds will be variable however, and those who apply chemicals by air should monitor wind conditions carefully over the next several days.
