LABOR DAY IS One of Most Observed Holidays

Last Monday, the nation observed Labor Day which has come to be one of the most generally celebrated holidays in the United States. Peter J. McGuire was the first to suggest that a day in the year should be set aside in honor of labor. His proposal was accepted by the Central Labor Union and the first Labor Day holiday occurred on September 3, 1882. About five and a half years later the Legislature of Oregon, on February 21, 1887, set apart the first Monday in September as a state holiday in honor of labor. Almost before the middle of 1894 the day had become a legal holiday in thirty states, and by June 28 the holiday was to be observed nationwide.
