Entries For County Hay Show Due This Week

Entries for the 1976 Colorado County Hay Show will be received September 9, 10 and 11. They will be received at the Vocational Agriculture Building in Weimar Thursday, Sept. 9 from 1 to 4 p.m. Entries in Columbus will be received at the Memorial Park Arena (school grounds). They will be taken Friday, Sept. 10 from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. and Saturday, Sept. 11 from 8:00 to 11 a.m.

The Hay Show will be held October 8 on the courthouse lawn in Columbus. Samples received will be sent to the Wharton County Junior College Soil Testing Laboratory for chemical analysis of protein content. There will be no entry fee, and producers or hay owners may enter as many samples as they desire, but not more than one from each cutting.

To enter, a bale must be brought to the site of the receiving stations at the place and time specified. A core sample and a block will be taken for physical judging the date of the show. Loose hay will not be accepted, but provisions for collecting samples from round bales will be made.

Protein analysis on hay will establish a nutrient value and can be very vital in determining supplement needs, to properly winter livestock with minimum costs.

With the present cost of production, price of livestock preferred to cost-price squeeze, producers must utilize every alternative to reduce their costs and hay analysis is one method.

Usual cost of hay analysis is \$3.00 per sample, but by entering the Colorado County Hay Show, samples are run for free.

FARM WEATHER OUTLOOK THROUGH SATURDAY: Partly cloudy; skies and warm temperatures are forecast to continue over the Texas Rice Belt into the weekend. No agriculturally significant rainfall is expected this afternoon through Wednesday. There is an increased chance of showers and thunderstorms Thursday through Saturday. High temperatures will continue generally in the 90's and lows in the 70's. Moderate dew is expected the next few nights with drying off time about the 10's.

PAST WEATHER: Rainfall has been quite sporadic and generally light during the three-day weekend. The only significant rainfall reported was an inch at Galveston on Sunday morning. Daytime high temperatures were generally in the low 90's and a few readings in the 80's along the coast. Nighttime lows were in the 70's.

HARVEST: Corn, sorghum, rice and cotton harvest should move along through Wednesday. Dew will likely slow starting times until mid-morning for the next few days. A few delays due to rainfall are possible Thursday through Saturday. PEANUT LEAF SPOT: The overnight weather has been too cool for the rapid spread and development of peanut leaf spot disease in most of the Rice Belt areas. Higher moisture levels occurred with recent rains may promote the leaf spot development in some fields however. The forecast weather in general still not favor leaf spot disease development for the next few days.

APPLICATION OF AGRICULTURAL CHEMICALS: Light and variable winds should not cause any serious drift problems for the next few days. The chances of showers Thursday through Saturday should be considered while planning applications. CROP GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT: Abundant sunshine through Wednesday should promote good growth in most crops where soil moisture is adequate. Showers and thunderstorms Thursday through Saturday will benefit the growth and development of soybeans, peanuts and pastures in some areas.

Angleton Research Station Open House Sept. 23

Research work relating to pasture and beef cattle production will be highlighted at an open house at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station at Angleton Sept. 23.

According to Marvin E. Riewe, professor in charge of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station facility, the event is designed to give agricultural producers and agribusinessmen a firsthand look at research programs dealing with beef and forage production in the Coastal Plains.

Tours of research plots on the 156-acre station will begin at 3:30 p.m., but Riewe emphasizes that anyone arriving by 5 p.m. can still complete the tour.

A barbecue hosted by the Agriculture Committee of the Commerce will be served beginning at 5:30 p.m. and a short program will follow.

On the tour visitors will have an opportunity to see and hear about new bermudagrasses, adapted legumes and legume seed inoculation, smutgrass con-

trol, sodseeded winter pastures, perennial grass pastures and pasture quality research in beef production. Speakers will include Experiment Station scientists at College Station and Angleton. Assisting with the tour will be county agents in District 11 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, with Brazoria County Agent Lee Wilson serving as tourmaster.

The evening program chaired by District Extension Agent Dr. O. B. Clifton will include a welcome by Riewe and a discussion on the economics of grazing stocker calves by Dr. Art Gerlow, area economist for the Extension Service. A question and answer session will conclude the event.

The Angleton station is located three miles northeast of the city on State Highway 35.

Wharton Co. Livestock Fifteen hundred head of cattle were handled at the Wharton County Livestock Market sale Sept. 1st. The market was one to three cents lower on all classes of cattle except slaughter cows which were steady to one cent lower. The owners reported very good demand at the lower price with good buyer attendance.

Choice stocker and feeder steers in the 450 to 550 lb. range sold \$7 to \$9 while 500 to 600 lb. standard steers brought \$7 to \$8. Choice heifers in the 350 to 450 lb. group went \$1 to \$6, utility slaughter cows brought \$4 to \$6.

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
