

Republican Women Of County Hear Candidate Paul McClure

Colorado County Republican Women met September 14 at Mrs. Griffith's home in Aliefon. The meeting was called to order by the president, Evelyn Virnau. Mrs. Virnau opened the meeting with a prayer and a scripture from the Bible. Approximately 25 people were present.

The club voted to pay \$15 to cover the cost of the conference room in Eagle Lake which was used for the meeting. The club also discussed setting up headquarters for the election in Eagle Lake, Columbia and Weimar. It was voted to have two telephones in each headquarters. Mr. McClure has a Ph.D. in mechanical engineering. Before coming to a professor at the University of Texas, he worked at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland and at the University of Cambridge in England. He has had experience throughout his career dealing with government agencies.

Mr. McClure said that the reason he is running is to fight for the freedom that was established 200 years ago by our forefathers. He compared the government with a machine. Apply forces and a machine will work and be controlled. The government now is applying its forces on the people and imposing its control of the people. He gave the example of social relationships being forced on the people by busing. He stated that the massive control of the government over our lives resulted in massive spending. He believes in "pay as you go" basis policy and not a large debt. In his conclusion he related that freedom of the individual's rights is his responsibility. If the responsibility is taken away from the individual and given to the government, then he loses his liberty.

After McClure spoke, Paul and Susan Causy of Eagle Lake talked about our awareness of the government's need for support in this election year. Mrs. Causy presented the need to "do all we can" to support the party and the candidates. Mr. Causy closed with a song he had written about supporting Uncle Sam.

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9-Day Teal Hunt Opens Sat.

A nine-day early teal shooting season will open this Saturday at a hunt with the season on the teal ducks will continue open through Sunday, Sept. 26th.

A good migration of the small, but tasty teal, have moved into the area and some good hunting is expected. The shortage of water in the area is expected to make large ponds and flooded areas real hot spots when the season opens Saturday.

Shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset with a daily bag limit of four birds and a possession limit of eight, after the first day of hunting. A valid hunting license is required if hunting out of the county of residence, and a \$5 federal stamp is necessary.

The season on morning doves in the South Zone, Texas, which includes this area, does not open until Sept. 26th. Last year both early teal and morning dove seasons opened on the same date, but not this year.
