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Rice Mkt Glutted, Prices Stay Down

Rice, rice, rice everywhere and no place for it to go. That about sums up the current rice market for U.S. producers with the first cutting of the 1976 crop almost complete.

"Such domestic use of rice as well as foreign shipments are down, and in the wake of a bumper crop this year, U.S. rice stocks will hover around the 140 million hundred-weight mark during this current marketing year," points out Dr. Randall Stelly, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Even with accelerated movement of rice abroad under the P.L. 480 program (Food for Peace), a record carryover of some 42 million hundredweights by next Aug. 1 appears likely. "A big reason for this is the more than 31 million hundredweights left over from the 1975 crop," notes Stelly. "Stocks in storage during the previous two years totaled only 4 million hundredweights."

Of the total rough rice on hand, long grain varieties make up nearly 46 percent; medium grain, 43 percent; and short grain, 11 percent. Comparing rice stocks on Aug. 1 to a year ago, the situation looked like this: long grain, 14.3 million hundredweights to 1.5 million; medium grain, 13.6 million to 1.3 million; and short grain, 3.5 million to 1.3 million.

Stelly also points out that this year's crop of long grain rice is expected to be 1.5 million hundredweights, up 60 percent from a year ago and 39 percent above two years ago. This quantity is the largest since 1959 when 6 million hundredweights of milled rice were on hand.

Where does all this leave rice prices?

"There will likely be continued downward pressure on rice prices at all levels for the remainder of the season," contends Stelly. "Better quality long grain rice in Texas was bringing from \$6.75 to \$7.25 per hundredweight the last week of August, and that situation will probably continue in the coming weeks. However, P.L. 480 type rice is showing strength, with bids by exporters for medium grain milled rice at \$10.25 per hundredweight."

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Harold Thomas Speaks To Rotary On Rice Problems

Harold Thomas, local rice producer and also chairman of the State ASCU committee, presented an interesting program at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday last week, discussing some of the problems facing the rice industry through legislation affecting the industry.

Thomas noted that two years ago, rice farmers were permitted to produce rice on an unlimited basis. "We were able to raise as much rice as we pleased, but then we had to decide what to do with it," said the speaker.

Yields have been increasing annually and with good world-wide crops, there is now an abundance of rice.

Under Target Price "For the first time ever, it appears that the government will have to pay the difference between the average price received by rice producers and the target price which was established under farm legislation which will be in effect for 1976 and 1977 crops," said Thomas. He noted however that the system will apply only to allotted acreage.

He also discussed provisions of the present law which provide aid in the event of a disaster, but noted that generally speaking this aid will be enough to buy a bus ticket to leave town.

Arthur Anderson, chairman of the annual Rotary Club Chuck Wagon Barbecue Supper, which will be held October 26th at the Community Center, passed out committee assignments. Also president Jim Stangel presided at a discussion of the club's annual Christmas in December party which has been tentatively set for Dec. 14th.
