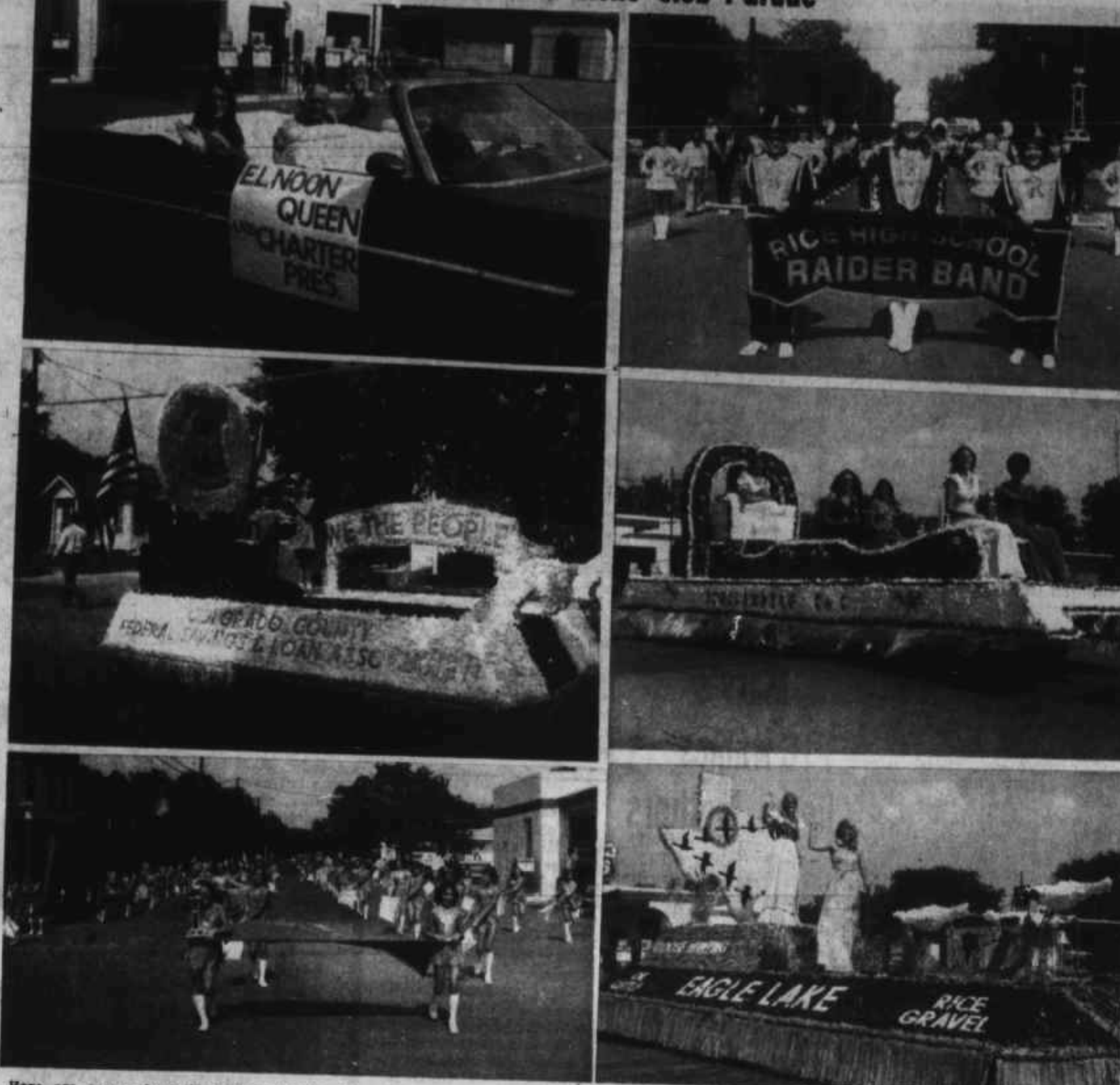


Scenes From Lions Club Parade

the animal was in violation. Mayor Struss recommended that the council approve the ordinance setting out the method of handling dogs considered as vicious animals (attacking or biting a person off the property of the owner).

"Authority for city officers to write citations to owners of pets that are found to be in violation of the leash and nuisance provisions; "After proposed violation fines and doubling the fine for succeeding offenses, up to a maximum of \$100; "On recommendation of Councilman Alvin Koblhoff, an article will be included to provide exemption to some portions of the leash provisions to the handicapped and blind.

Many hunters mistakenly believe they do their part through the purchase of licenses and duck stamps. But this money is spent only within the United States and cannot be used above the Canadian border where about eighty percent of our ducks are hatched.
