FARM WEATHER OUTLOOK THROUGH SATURDAY: Scattered thunderstorms are forecast for the Texas Rice Belt today and tonight. Rainfall amounts in excess of one inch are possible in heavier showers. Temperatures will be cool for the remainder of the week with highs mostly in the 70's and minimums in the upper 50's.

**PAST WEATHER:** One-inch rains fell in the Western Rice Belt during the past 24 hours. Lighter rains were reported in eastern areas. Temperatures Monday climbed into the mid 80's and overnight lows were in the mid 60's.

**FIELD WORK:** Planting of cotton fields and harvest activities may be delayed in a few areas in the Western Rice Belt due to wet fields. Additional delays may occur today with some lasting late into the week.

**WINTER GRAINS AND PASTURES:** Land preparation may be slowed by rains during the next few days. Rains should, however, help establish grains and pastures already seeded.

**APPLICATION OF AGRICULTURAL CHEMICALS:** Winds may reach moderate levels today during the afternoon hours and may cause problems due to drift. Farmers should use caution if applying chemicals this afternoon. Farmers should also consider the chances of rain before spraying begins.
